Traditional Memorial Day services will be held Thursday at 11 a. m. in the old City Cemetery.

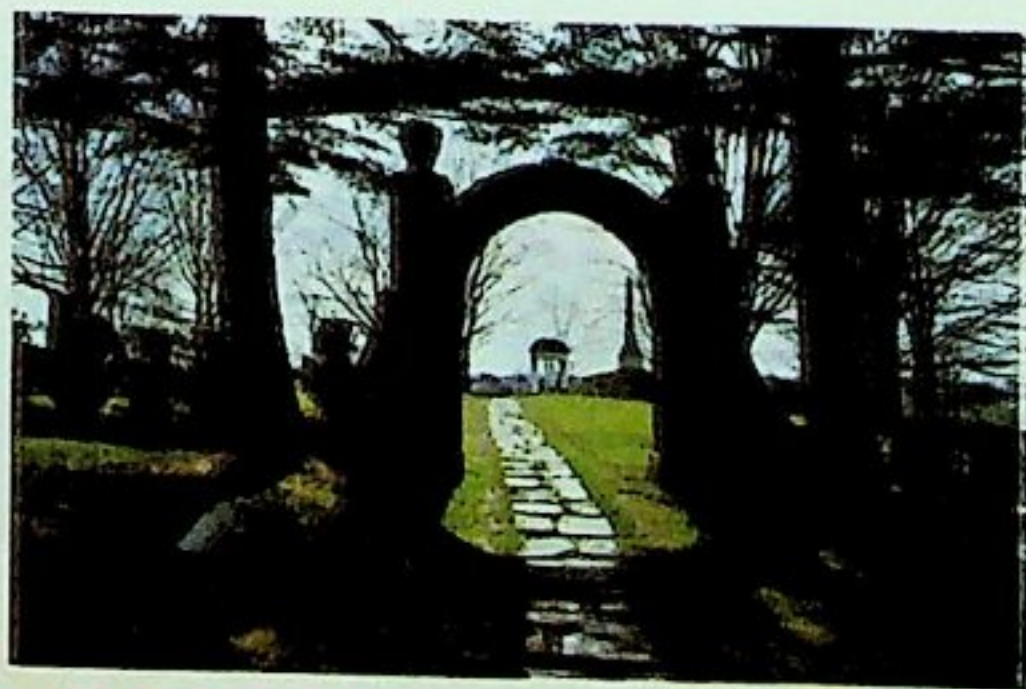

Memorial Day observance held at Centenary Church

A plea for renewal of faith, respect for peace and law and order, was made today in the annual Memorial Day address in the Centenary United Methodist Church.

The Rev. Walter M. Lockett Jr., pastor Centenary United Methodist Church, spoke on "Our Heritage" at the exercises sponsored each year by the United Daughters of the Confederacy and the Southern Memorial Association.

The speaker, who was introduced by Mrs. S. W. West, retiring president of the Kirkwood Otey Chapter of the UDC, said, "On Sept. 30, 1865, a scant five months after Lee's surrender at Appomattox, there was a meeting of citizens of Lynchburg in Dudley Hall, to express our opinion upon the existing conditions of the country, and in regard to the solemn responsibility which devolves upon all who desire the promotion of its welfare."

Concerning the conflict just ended, they agreed, "of the agencies which produced this conflict, whether springing from the North or the South, or from both, in what proportion, it is profitless now to speak... to this we pledge our faith and shall go forward with a new hope... and thus seek to establish once more fraternity between the like contending section and restore forever to our distracted country the blessings of peace, order, law and constitutional freedom."

Lockett said, "Once more our country is torn by divisive forces. It is profitless to seek to blame for our present condition. What is needed is a new pledge of faith, such as that expressed by citizens of Lynchburg more than 100 years ago, so that we may go forward with renewed hope to restore

to our distracted country peace, order, law and constitutional freedom.

"At any point in time the most any of us can do is to do his duty according to the best light that he has. That was true of these Confederate dead who lie buried here. It is true today. New information and new insight may alter our understanding of what our duty is. But at the moment, the best we can do is to be faithful to our duty as we understand it."

Lockett offered the invocation and the benediction.

Special tribute was paid to the late Mrs. Dexter Otey, past president of the Southern Me-

morial Association, and the late Miss Agnes Brosch, a member of the Kirkwood Otey Chapter.

Mrs. Edward J. Hotchkiss Jr. of the SMA, Miss Katharine Gilbert of the Old Dominion Chapter and Mrs. Wilbur C. Whitten of the Kirkwood Otey, represented their groups.

Miss Vesta Walker, incoming president of the Kirkwood Otey Chapter led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States and Miss Ruth Burgess, president of the Old Dominion Chapter, led the Salute to the Confederate Flag.

Taps were sounded by Malcolm H. Burgess and Malcolm H. Burgess Jr.

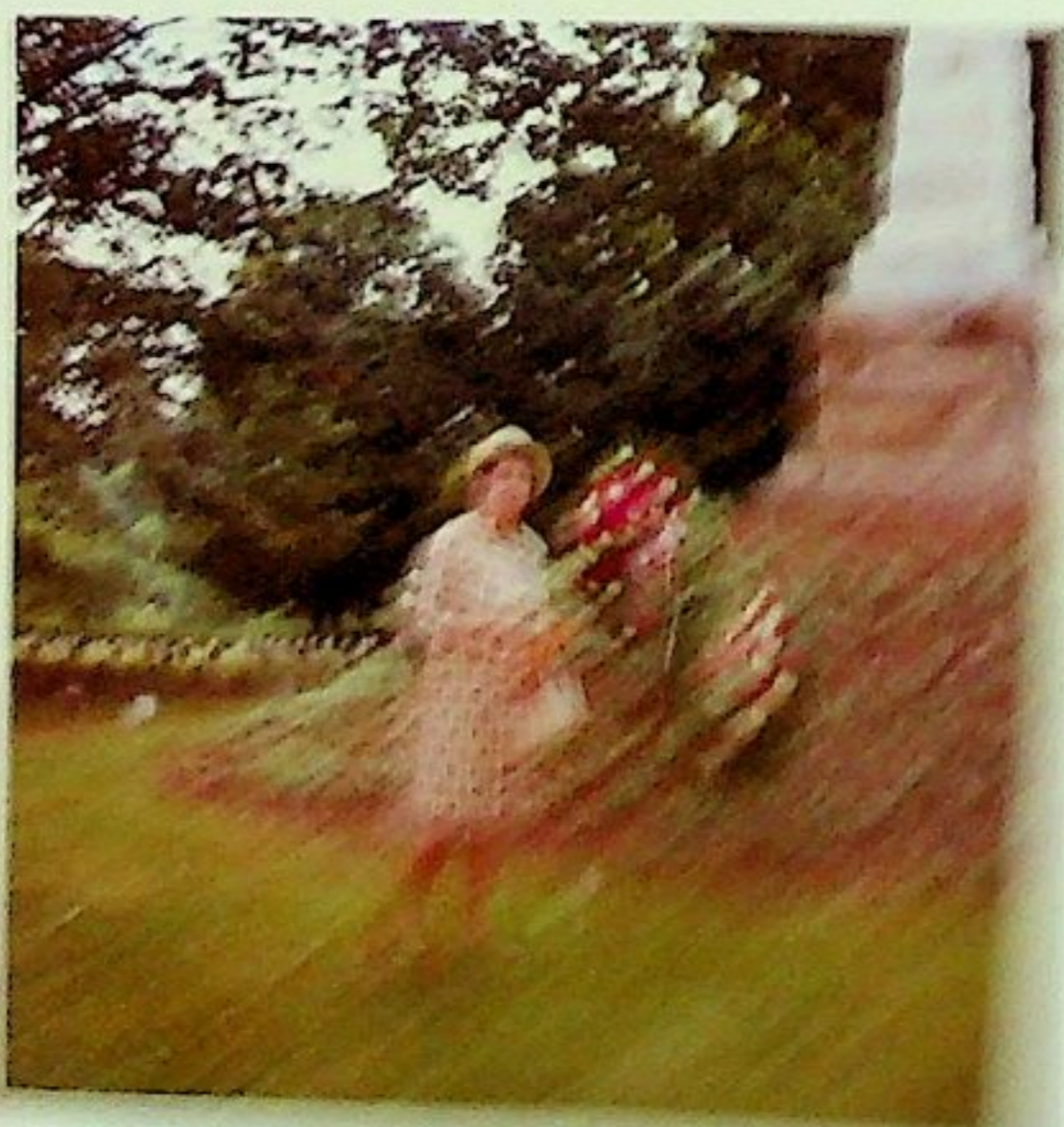

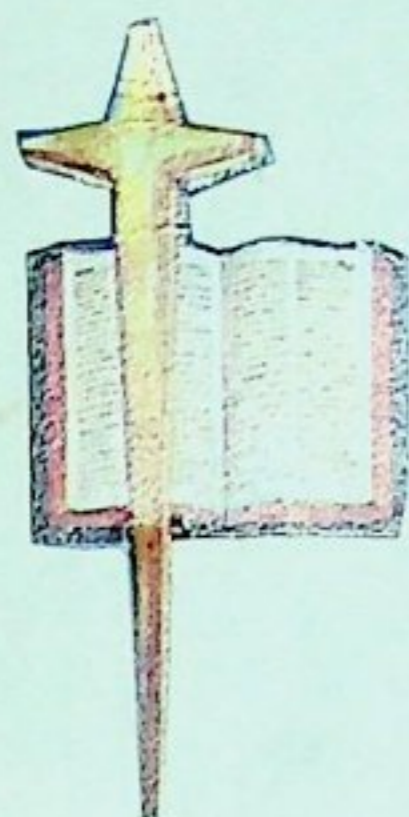

Afterward, a memorial wreath will be placed on the confederate Monument in Greenhill Cemetery.

Buses will be provided for members to go to and from the church.

On Tuesday the convention will observe their historical evening. Miss Hattie Moseley, historian of the Virginia Division, will preside over the activities beginning at 8 p.m.

Dr. Thomas K. Stahl, head of the history department at Stratford College, will deliver an address on Confederate history during the historical evening.

On Wednesday at 9 a.m., the business meeting is slated to open. At 12:30 p.m., the Real Daughters' Luncheon, presided over by Mrs. George Huxter, will be held. Mrs. Huxter is president of the Real Daughters' Club of Virginia.

The Virginia Division of the UDC is composed of 84 chapters with approximately 3,000 members.

Over 200 Attend Colorful Activities Of State UDC Convention In Danville

The 78th convention of the Virginia Division, United Daughters of the Confederacy, has brought some 200 members from all parts of the state to Danville for multiple activities headquartered at the Downtowner Motor Inn.

This morning's business session was followed by a midday luncheon for more than two dozen "real daughters"—members whose parents were Confederate veterans—with Samuel Albert Kushner Jr. making an address on Confederate history.

"Historical Evening" was observed by the UDC last night, when proceedings were launched by a colorful procession that included a Virginia National Guard color guard, chapter historians and recorders, general officers and past officers, recipients of special honors and other invited guests, including Danville Mayor Robert Clarke.

The Cross of Military Service was presented to Julian Shaw Ogburn Jr. of Richmond, formerly of Danville, who saw World War II service in the Pacific from 1943 to 1945 in the U.S.

Naval Hospital Corps. He is a son of Mrs. E.F. Holton and the late J.S. Ogburn.

Recipient of the Jefferson Davis Medal was Danville attorney Samuel A. Kushner Sr.

Dr. Thomas K. Stahl, Stratford College history professor, was the Historical evening speaker, and music was presented by Stratford's Madrigal Singers and Dr. John C. Atwood, the group's conductor.

Earlier yesterday, at First Presbyterian Church, there was a memorial service in tribute to deceased UDC members in Virginia, and special chapter memorials were presented at that time.

At the conclusion of the service, the memorial wreath—marked by a carnation for each deceased member—was accepted by Mrs. Russell B. Frost Jr., president of the Virginia Division, and was placed at the Confederate Monument in Green Hill Cemetery.

"Chapter Presidents' Evening" will be the featured event on the program tonight. Mrs. Stuart Blanton Grodon, vice-

president, will preside, and will award the Minnie C. Eller Banner and Vice President's Prizes.

Another award—a prize for the best original poem—will be presented by Mrs. W. Sterling Wood, Southern Poets chairman for the Virginia Division.

The second business session of the convention will be held tomorrow morning, and will be climaxed by the election of officers for the state organization.
