Pfc. Otha B. Eubank has been liberated from a German prison camp and expects to be home soon, according to a letter received by his wife, Mrs. Ada C. Eubank.

Cpl. J. Hampton Waldron, who is with the amphibious force, is now somewhere in the Moluccas, according to a letter which his wife received from him recently.

Pvt. George William Carter has returned to California after a 12-day furlough with his wife and children on Bedford Route 5.

Sgt. Raymond J. Creasy, of Fort Bliss, Texas, who spent a few days furlough with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Creasy, in Bedford, returned to his post at Fort Bliss, Texas.

Company A Man Returns Home

S-Sgt. Robert L. Goode arrived home Saturday morning after 32 months overseas. He was with Company A, 116th Infantry, 29th Division, when it left Bedford in February, 1941, and is the first to receive his discharge by the point system and return home. He was a squadron leader and combat unit member in the D-Day invasion of Normandy. Wounded twice during the invasion, he was awarded the Purple Heart with the Combat Infantryman's Badge and the Presidential Unit Citation. His brothers and sisters live at Huddleston. He is a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Goode.

Farm Life Movie Being Made Here

To be Shown to Service
Men Interested in
Becoming Farmers

In order to show men in the service, who are planning to become farmers after the war, what to expect, the United States Department of Agriculture, Office of Information, is making a movie depicting typical farm life and Bedford county has been selected as the setting for the film. Edward Freed, director, and Russell Anderson, cameraman, from the Motion Picture Service of this department, are in the county now and have already visited a number of locations and taken various scenes.

The film, "Veterans and the Land," will be the story of a returning veteran who, having decided to become a farmer, first hires out as a farm hand and later purchases a place of his own. The part of the returning veteran will be played by Graham Creel. Other members of the cast, all of whom will be selected in Bedford county, have not yet been announced. The movie will include instructive scenes relating to modern methods of farming, animal husbandry and the type of equipment needed, as well as general scenes designed to show typical farm life and problems.

In selecting locations, Mr. Freed and Mr. Anderson, assisted by S. S. Hyton, county agent, have already visited and taken pictures at Charlie Jennings, dairy farm, on Bedford Route 2, Ivy Hill, owned by Herbert Thomson near Perrowville and E. T. Garraghty's, Brook Hill. Miller Overstreet's home has been selected for some interior scenes in the scenes connected with the returning veteran's experiences as a farm hand. Hay making at the farm of Henry McGhee on the Leesville road was used as another scene and pictures were also taken of J. B. Hodges' peach orchard and of the Hereford cattle pastured at S. B. Robertson's farm, both on the Perrowville road.

All of the pictures taken will not be used in the local movie, as material is also being collected for a livestock feeding film which will be made for use by county agents and universities.

On Tuesday, Mr. Freed and Mr. Anderson took pictures of an agricultural meeting held in the courthouse which included members of the H. D. executive committee and the Blue Ridge Soil Conservation Commission. Both groups happened to have meetings scheduled for this time and were combined to give the appearance of a typical farm gathering, which was attended by the returning veteran.

Mr. Freed and Mr. Anderson are both veterans of World War II, the former having served with the Army Air Corps and the latter as cameraman with the Marine Corps in the Pacific.

Mr. Anderson, a resident of the Philippine islands for 36 years, was interned in this camp with his wife and two daughters, Mary, 22; Jeannette, 12, and son, Walter, Jr., 14, for two years. An adopted Filipino daughter was not taken prisoner and slipped food to them in the camp whenever possible. The girl has accompanied the family to the United States.

Mrs. Cottrell has invited friends to her home between 2:30 p. m. and 3:00 p. m. Sunday to meet her brother and hear a first hand account of his experiences. She said that she would be glad for anyone who would be interested to come at this time.

Gives Record of Candidate in Race For Lieut.-Governor

At a meeting of the American Association of University Women last week, Miss M. L. Richardson presented to the group biographical data and the legislative record of Lt.-Col. Charles R. Fenwick, member of the House of Delegates and a candidate for lieutenant-governor at the Democratic primary, August 7. Mrs. E. D. Gregory, chairman of the Legislative committee, introduced Miss Richardson with the statement that she thought that it was most important that members of the A. A. U. W. familiarize themselves with the record of men who are running for state and national office in order that they might be sure of obtaining the best possible conditions.

Miss Richardson stated that she was personally acquainted with Colonel Fenwick and knew him to be a man of extreme fairness, honesty and integrity. She gave the following highlights in his legislative record, which "speaks for itself," stressing the work that Colonel Fenwick has done to obtain legislation for better rural health conditions.

"Colonel Fenwick," she said, "has sponsored important legislation particularly in connection with juvenile delinquency, aid to dependent children and greater medical facilities for the rural areas. He is, at present, chairman of the sub-committee of the Legislative Council studying cancer control and health facilities for rural areas. In both the 1940 and 1942 sessions of the Legislature, Colonel Fenwick voted for the bill appropriating funds and was a patron on the bill increasing the minimum salaries of teachers. He also introduced eight scholarships for the University of Virginia and four for the Medical College of Virginia, under which the recipient agrees to serve in rural areas. This was a pioneer legislation. He has expressed particular concern over the lack of medical facilities for the vast farm areas, many of which have no doctor, and will, Colonel Fenwick has pointed out, affect generations to come, if not remedied."

"Colonel Fenwick favors the Denny report in principle and its application within the financial resources of the state. "Colonel Fenwick was patron on the Sign Board bill which was sponsored by the Garden Clubs of Virginia and passed by the Legislature. He was principal patron on the bill establishing the Potomac River Basin Commission, a conservation plan to prevent pollution of the Potomac River and its tributaries."

Super Bomber Raids on Tokyo; Chinese Troops Recapture Port

American bombers have opened up on Japan where they left off in Germany and the Pacific enemy is beginning to feel the weight of the same kind of aerial offensive which wrecked German cities and industry. In two super-bomber raids on Tokyo last week, Thursday and Saturday, the business area of the Japanese capital was practically destroyed. Pictures taken later show that 51 square miles in the heart of the city had been wiped out, and even the imperial palace did not escape damage. The Tokyo radio admitted that the capital city, third largest in the world, would have to be rebuilt from scratch. About 500 of the huge bombers took part in these raids and the same number hit Yokohama Tuesday, setting huge fires in this city of a million people. Yokohama is 18 miles from Tokyo and is the port city of the capital.

On Okinawa the Japanese defense appears to be collapsing, with enemy forces retreating to the island's southern tip for a last stand. Naha, the capital and chief port, has been captured, and Shuri fortress, keystone of Japanese defenses, was outflanked by the break through along the eastern coast. The town's defenses have been penetrated at several points and retreat of the garrison is threatened by an American advance south of the citadel. It was first estimated that Japs on the island numbered not more than 80,000, and as more than 50,000 already have been killed, they must be scraping the bottom of their manpower barrel.

As was the case last week, the big news of the Pacific war comes from China. Chinese troops, in their most important victory in months, have recaptured the big port of Yungling, in southern China, and severed the land communication line of the enemy connecting Manchuria with southern Asia and the East Indies. These, combined with the recapture of the American 14th air fighter base, is a most serious blow to the enemy.

Following up the initial success, the Chinese army opened up a general offensive in southern China on a front of several hundred miles and have widened to 120 miles the breach in the captured bridge to southeast Asia. The Chinese are pursuing the Japs across south China toward Indo-China and are less than 100 miles from the border of that country.

Reports from Chungking says the Japs apparently are preparing a withdrawal in the central sector of their overland route from Manchuria to southern Asia, this time from Ichang, on the Yangtze river. Recent Chinese victories have not only given them two ports on their east coast, but by recapturing the Yungling, they have isolated all Japanese forces in southern Asia and the Indies from their homeland, as American sea and air forces have completely cut off shipping by water from Japan to her stolen empire in the south. The latest figures show that more than 4,000,000 tons of enemy shipping have been sunk by our submarines alone, and now seldom is a Jap

ship seen trying to pass through the narrow waters between the Philippines and the Asiatic mainland. Withdrawal of Jap troops from central China probably is dictated by fear of what Russia may do, and Japan is trying to bolster her strength in the north to meet the new emergency, should it develop.

General MacArthur reports that his forces in the Philippines have scored further victories on Luzon and Mindanao, and the end of Jap resistance seems in sight. The area on Luzon held by the enemy has been further restricted and on Mindanao American armies advancing from north and south have formed a junction, cutting the enemy forces in two. American war planes, operating from the Philippines, last week struck from Shanghai to the southern Indies, destroyed or damaged 33 Japanese merchant ships, with one lone Liberator bomber accounting for 20 of them in an attack on an enemy concentration off Borneo.

In Germany most of the big wigs, except Ribbentrop, are dead in a matter of minutes. He was captured early last week, but escaped Allied justice by swallowing poison he had kept hidden in his mouth for several days after his capture. Only when he was ordered to open his mouth in the final search did he crumh and swallow the poison container, dying in a few minutes. He was buried secretly to prevent the Germans of a later day from marking his grave.

First Member of 29th To be Discharged

Pvt. Edwin Barton, of Vinton, Route 1, is thought to be the first member of the 29th Division to be returned to United States under the new system. He was on his way home when Germany surrendered and has received his discharge after four years of service. He has two Bronze and Silver Stars and two Presidential Citations.

He is a grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. Strat Barton, of Stewartville.

Lt. Watts Gills Is Liberated From Prison Camp

Lt. Watts Gills has been liberated from a German prison camp on the Baltic and is now back in France waiting, along with "70,000 others," for transportation home, according to word received Monday by his wife, the former Miss Mary Lydia Lyle, of Bedford. A telegram from the War Department was received first on Monday and followed by two letters from Lieutenant Gills.

The camp in which Lieutenant Gills was held prisoner was in the path of the Russian advance and the Germans withdrew, leaving it in American hands before the Russians got there. However, an air field had to be built and it was three weeks after the Russians had passed through the camp before the liberated men could get out.

Negro Indicted by Special Grand Jury

Fred Q. Butler, 37, Negro, was indicted by a special grand jury last Friday for attempted rape and the trial was set for June 18. He was charged with attacking a white woman near Boonboro. The jury was composed of J. L. Davidson, foreman; Mike Reynolds, Lewis White, T. H. Nance, W. H. Wildman, C. H. Rucker and George Parker, the latter a Negro.

On Tuesday W. B. Moseley, of Lynchburg, was fined \$100 in Circuit Court on a reckless driving charge, and acquitted on a charge of drunken driving. Glimmer Park, also charged with reckless driving, was tried on the same day and dismissed.

Cases Heard in the Trial Justice Court

Milton J. Turner, Huddleston, was fined \$10 for reckless driving and causing a wreck when his case was heard by the trial justice last week. He backed into a school bus on May 18. Silas J. Holmes and Willard A. Arthur were also fined \$10 each for reckless driving. They were both driving trucks and had a wreck near Stewartville on May 17. Arthur was also fined an additional \$5 for driving without a permit.

Edward Saunders, charged with disorderly conduct at M. E. Marcuse High School, Big Island, on May 15, was fined \$20. Francis Dunn was fined \$10 for fishing without a license, and Kerford Daniel \$50 for having in his possession illegal ardent spirits on May 28.

John M. Fitzgerald, 17, driver of a school bus which turned over near Montvale Monday last week, and Kerford S. Padgett, driver of the dump truck which collided with the bus, were each fined \$10 on a charge of reckless driving.

New Program to be Made County-Wide

County Road Improvements to be Main Objective of Organization

The development of a better system of roads in Bedford county will be one of the main projects of the Bedford County Chamber of Commerce during the coming year, judging from the discussion which took place at the annual meeting last Thursday night. J. L. Davidson started the ball rolling by stating that he considered that one of the chief functions of any chamber of commerce was to work toward the improvement of roads in the county, both primary and secondary. He pointed out that the Bedford County Chamber of Commerce was the logical body to handle such matters. Bedford received nothing from the State Highway Department for the fiscal year beginning July 1, he stated and "if we don't present our case and argue it intelligently, we are going to get passed by."

Roy J. Hurt, Bedford, Route 2, expressed his opinion as being in accord with Mr. Davidson and suggested the forming of a committee in order that active work might be started in this direction. J. M. Davidson, president of the county organization, said: "We know that the tourist road is one of the nicest and most profitable to be had" and that much work must be done before Bedford county would be in a position to handle it. He agreed with Mr. Hurt that a committee such as he advocated should be appointed, and this phase of development cared for while the work for new industries which the Chamber of Commerce already engaged in be continued.

Motions were made from the floor that not only should such a committee be appointed by the new directors, when they are elected at this meeting, but that appointments of committee members should not, as heretofore, be confined to members of the board, but selected from the county as a whole in order to get those who were best qualified to do the job.

Concomitant with the proposed of Doris Cooke, A. G. Cummings, and F. O. Thomas was appointed by the president. Several more were nominated from the floor and the following new board was elected: W. W. Burks, nominations were also made from R. E. Wilkerson, E. Ferguson, W. H. Walton, G. W. Bond, J. L. Davidson, Gordon Synan, W. H. Brydges, W. L. Lyle, W. P. Hurt, Frank Scott and R. E. White.

A meeting of the new board was held on Tuesday night and the organization was further streamlined and coordinated for the pursuit of a comprehensive program which will unite the efforts of every section of the county. J. M. Davidson was re-elected president and G. W. Bond, secretary; W. H. Brydges, Big Island, first vice-president; W. H. Walton, Huddleston, second vice-president. The following committees were appointed: Roads committee: W. L. Lyle, chairman; W. H. Walton, W. R. Phelps, R. B. Wilkerson and E. T. Ferguson. It was pointed out that each section of the county is represented on this committee and each member will form a sub-committee composed of men in his community to take care of the particular needs of that community.

The Tobacco committee will be continued with Robert F. Johnson, chairman; T. E. Reynolds, Lambert Martin and Joe Smith.

Retail Merchants committee: Gates Richardson, chairman; D. Mooreman, T. E. Reynolds, Lambert Martin and Joe Smith.

Herbert Benn, who at the general meeting, outlined a plan for general publicity for the town and county, was appointed chairman of the publicity committee, the members of which will be chosen later as the need arises.

Gasoline Ration To be Increased

Effective June 22, the A card value for gasoline will be increased 50 per cent from four to six gallons. On June 11, B card ceilings will be increased to 650 miles per month throughout the country, if the holders of these cards can show their local rationing boards that they have a real need for more gasoline than they are now using.

These changes were announced last week by the Petroleum Administration and the OPA as a result of the victory in Europe.

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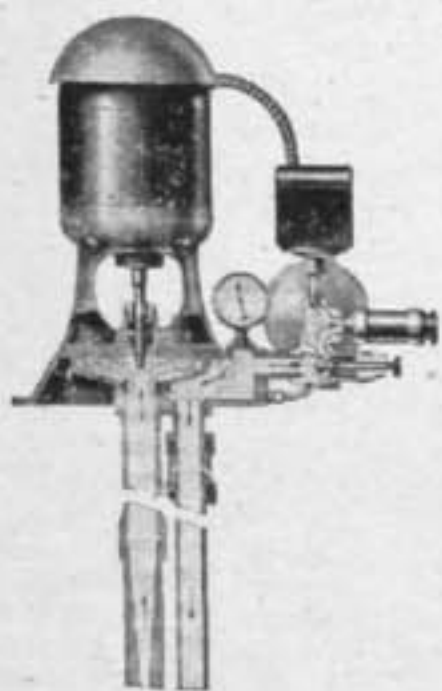

New Regulations for Subscribers Overseas

In order to conserve shipping space the Post Office Department has issued new regulations, effective July 1, governing the mailing of newspapers and periodical publications addressed to personnel of the navy, marine corps and coast guard overseas.

The new regulations read: Individual copies of newspapers and magazines offered for mailing by publishers, addressed via the fleet post offices to navy, marine corps and coast guard personnel on duty overseas, shall be accepted only when they are being sent in fulfillment of written requests initiated by the addressee for subscriptions or renewals of subscriptions.

Postmasters at the offices of mailing shall require publishers to present for their examination the requests from the addressee for subscriptions or renewals of subscriptions.

Relatives and friends may pay for the subscriptions or renewals for subscribers provided the addressee has initiated requests therefor.

These regulations already apply to the army.

Pfc. Reese Thomas Has Souvenir Hobby

WITH THE SIXTH ARMY ON LUZON—Many a GI in the Philippines may envy Reese C. Thomas, a Bedford, Virginian, because he collects Japanese souvenirs by the truckload. He even drives off with a stray tank now and then.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. A. R. Thomas of Bedford, Va., Private First Class Thomas is a battlefield salvage technician with the 678th Quartermaster Salvage Collecting Company, which rounds up enemy weapons and supplies battered loose from the Japanese by General Walter Kruger's Sixth Army troops.

Driving his truck up into the front lines, Thomas and his unit pick the battlefield as clean as a bone. They scout out the countless caves which the Japs burrowed into the Luzon mountains to hide supplies and to fight from. The thousands of tons of material they have already recovered is already being used against the enemy by our troops and Filipino guerrillas fighting with the Americans.

At one time, during the bitter cave to cave fighting in the mountains of Luzon, his outfit made its own salvage on the spot.

Bedded down near the front one night, they were roused at midnight when some 250 Japanese infiltrated their position. A four hour battle in the dark ensued before the enemy was driven off. Next morning the boys loaded a salvage truck full of rifles, grenades, light machineguns and other supplies left behind by the Japs.

Private First Class Thomas entered the armed forces in April 1943 and trained at Camp Pickett, Va. He was sent overseas in November 1944 and took part in the Philippine campaign. Before entering the service he attended Bedford High school and was employed by the Kroger Grocery and Baking Company, Bedford.

Montvale F. F. A. Wins Honors

The Federation of Future Farmers of America of the counties of Bedford, Amherst, Appomattox, and Campbell held the annual Crops and Livestock Judging Contest May 2, 1945. Eleven chapters entered the contest in which twelve classes were judged.

The three highest scores were as follows: Gladys, 2907; Montvale, 2870; Amherst, 2698.

Thaxton Man Runs Garden for Navy

AT A FORWARD BASE IN THE MARIANAS—Robert W. Leftwich, 25, machinist's mate, third class, USNR, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. H. Leftwich of Thaxton, Va., is farming for the Navy.

Leftwich and nearly 100 of his shipmates are growing garden produce for the hospitals and camps on the island.

Leftwich served in the Seabees before being transferred to the farm on a nearby island, and then to general duties on this farm.

Tank Battalion Helps Cross Rhine

6TH ARMY GROUP, GERMANY—A stubborn German resistance was transformed into willing surrender when tankmen of the 753rd Tank Battalion recently covered U. S. Seventh Army doughboys of General Jacob L. Devers' 8th Army Group in the crossing of a Rhine River tributary. Pvt. Harland E. Thomas, of Vaughn, is a member of this battalion.

Three medium tanks moved up within 100 yards of a hill that overlooked the river and in 24 hours fired 900 shells into strong German emplacements there. They kept the Jerries pinned down while light tanks transported 36th "Texas" Division infantrymen through an exposed stretch terrain to the river. The Yanks crossed the river in boats and took the hill with 60 Germans surrendering. Prisoners said the tank fire was too much for them.

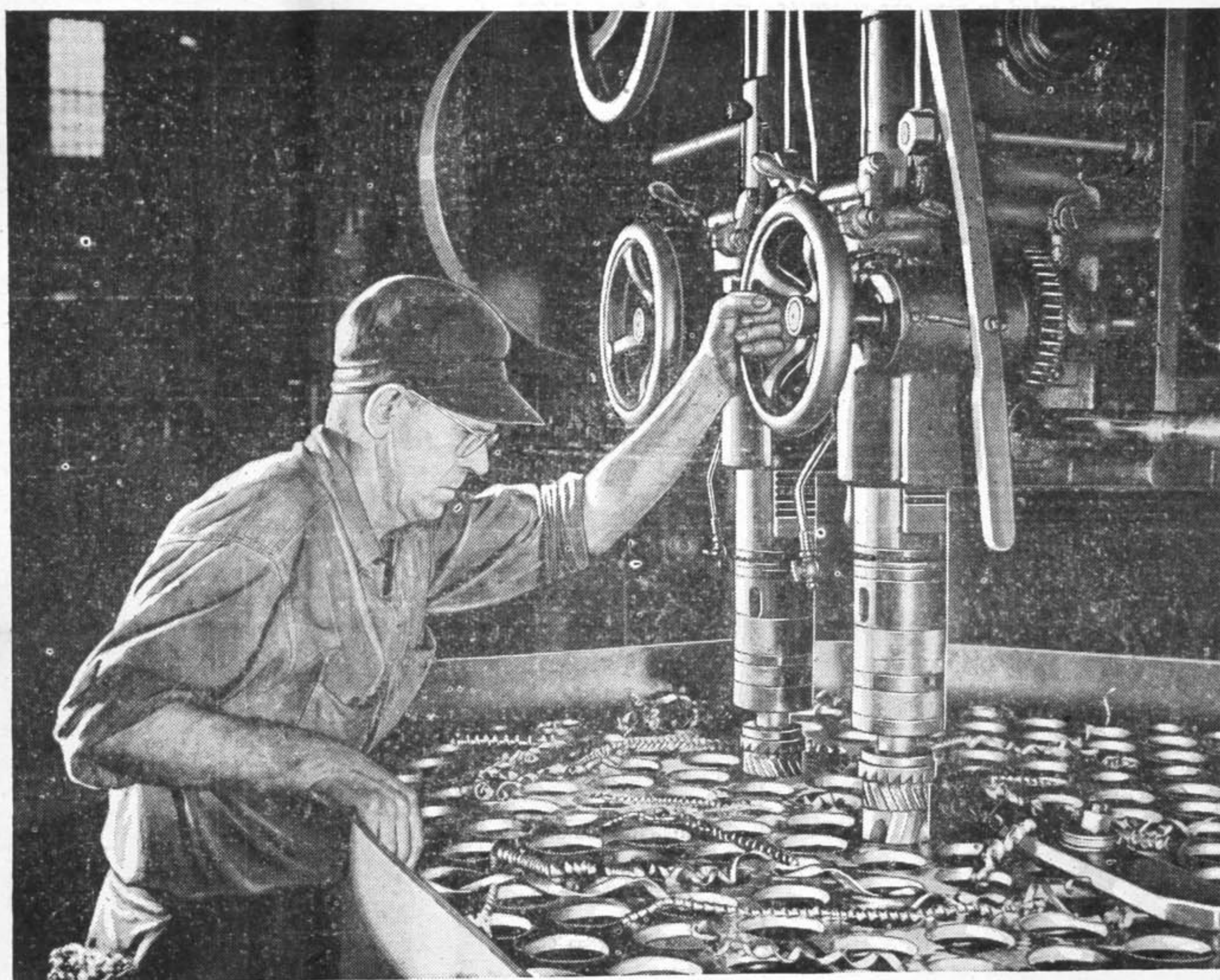

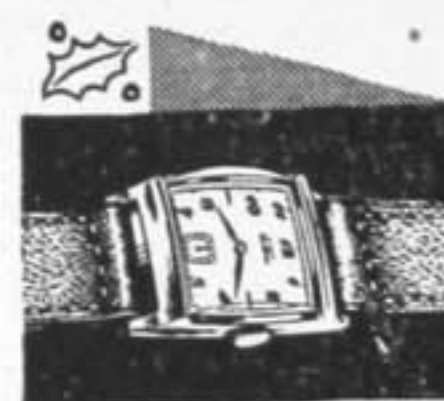

OUR OPPORTUNITY

The annual meeting of the Bedford Chamber of Commerce last Thursday evening, while not largely attended, was characterized by a spirit of enthusiasm not always in evidence on such occasions. Those who did attend exhibited a healthful interest, both in the plans and purposes of the organization and the possibilities for progress and development of Bedford county as a whole. A distinctly encouraging feature was the attendance of so many people, men and women, from the rural communities. Their presence gave hope that our people are coming to realize that all planning and working must be done on the county unit basis. If best results are to be obtained, we get nowhere by each town, village and neighborhood going it alone, each interested only in its own problems and striving separately to get what it wants.

A chamber of commerce, county-wide in its field of endeavor, is the logical center of planning and the logical agent and spokesman for all the various and manifold interests of the county as a whole. Through it the people can speak as a unit on any subject any part of the county centers its interest and purpose. By using the organization as the medium for the expression of neighborhood and district desires and interests the full weight of all the neighborhoods and districts is thrown behind each project. It should be obvious to everyone that more can be accomplished by the county planning and working as a unit than by each district and community going after what it wants separately and without support from the rest of the county.

With peace and the removal of war-time restrictions not so far in the future, every city, county and town in America is planning for the post-war years. Bedford county must do the same thing or be content to trail along near the end of the procession. The opportunity is ours. Much depends on how we use it, and the results of any planning or effort we make will be measured in large degree, we believe, on the support we give our Chamber of Commerce.

This organization has been in being for a great many years. It has accomplished much for Bedford, despite the starvation diet on which it has had to work the greater part of the time. It can and will accomplish a great deal more if given the proper support, and it is for this that the Bulletin makes appeal to the people of Bedford county as a whole. To plan and work for those things calculated to promote the interests and well-being of Bedford county and its people, financial support equal to the need must be supplied. Of equal importance, the people must believe in and work with the Chamber of Commerce if its efforts are to be effective. Either without the other imposes a serious handicap.

At the moment a campaign for improvement of Bedford county roads stands at the head of the chamber's list of objectives. That was made clear at the meeting Thursday night. Everybody in Bedford county has an interest in roads. They form the life-lines of county progress and development. This program must have the active backing of all sections of the county if its goal is to be reached, and this fact alone should be sufficient motive for county people working as a unit, with the chamber as their active agent and spokesman. Only when a well planned program for road improvement can be presented with the weight of the entire county behind it can we be sure that it will receive a favorable hearing.

The Chamber of Commerce is entitled to your support because it is the only organization through which the interests of all the people can find expression.

EXCUSE MY ASHES

Two GIs on a day off were strolling along a suburban road outside London when they saw on a hillside a building which said over its archway, "Hall of Remembrance," the British phrase for crematorium. With usual GI curiosity, one of them went in to see what it was.

A few moments later he came rushing out in such a hurry his friend thought someone was after him with a machine gun. To the other's question as to why the haste, the investigating GI said:

"Darned if I know. I walked in and there were a lot of people in black standing around a pit from which flames seemed to be coming. Some of them were crying. All I said before I got thrown out was, 'Hi, folks, what's cookin'?' "—Wall Street Journal.

SAVE THE SURPLUS

National income for the current year will top all records, and therein lies one of the most dangerous situations the country can possibly face—not excepting our war in the Pacific. This record income, estimated at 150 billion dollars, huddled rightly can and will be our best guarantee of continued prosperity in the years following the war. Handled wrongly, it can and will wreck our economic structure and bring ruin to the American people.

The danger lies in the relation this income bears to the amount of consumer goods available to the civilian population. The value of these goods, plus taxes, accounts for not more than 115 of the 150 billions of dollars the American people will receive this year, leaving a surplus of 35 billion, and the way in which we handle that 35 billion decides the future for good or ill. If it is squandered in high living, used in buying on the black markets at exorbitant prices, or is invested in doubtful ventures or real estate far above their normal peacetime values, an era of inflation will be ushered in which can result only one way—complete financial ruin for all. On the other hand, if this enormous surplus—equal to half the national income only a few years ago—is saved against any rainy day that may come, the country will emerge from the war period on a safe and sound financial footing, with nothing to fear in looking to the future.

Entirely too many of us are so intent on satisfying wants and desires of the moment that we give no thought to the effect present conduct will have upon our future and the future of our country. One of the prime objectives of the national administration is to bring understanding to the people about the perils they face at home. That is why most of the publicity given the Seventh War Loan is centering on the war against inflation. Money invested in War Bonds is money saved. The amount asked for is urgently needed for prosecuting the war against Japan, it is true, but of almost equal importance is the necessity that it be saved, kept in the hands of the people, as a safeguard against the future, and not squandered in the gratification of immediate desires. Probably the government could raise all the cash it needs for war purposes by borrowing from the banks and corporations which have surplus money on hand. That, in fact, would be the easy way, but it would not be the safe way. If inflation is to be averted the people must invest every dollar they can spare in War Bonds. This fact cannot be too strongly emphasized. Only universal adherence to this policy can guarantee an economically sound America in the post-war world.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

BABY CHICKS NEED EARLY FEEDING

"There is no danger of feeding chicks too soon or too much, but there is considerable mortality in baby chicks caused by holding them off feed too long," states M. A. Seaton, poultryman, Kansas State College, Manhattan. "Baby chicks should be placed in the brooder house as soon as possible and fed and watered."

Seaton recommends that the mash be placed on newspapers or egg case flats, and allow the chicks plenty of feed. After several days, the chicks can be trained to eat from mash feeders. Baby chicks grow rapidly, and a complete feed is necessary for growth and development. Mash usually is fed the first few weeks, and then grain and mash is hopped fed through the remainder of the growing period—Better Farm Equipment and Methods.

AN OAK GROWS SLOWLY

It's good to study the past, if one can prevent such pleasure from spoiling his outlook for the future. Delving into bygone days, we've been surprised to observe that in some fundamental respects, we don't know much more than we did 50 years ago. Far from discouraging us, that's very heartening. It takes the cockiness out of us; suggests that the human race builds slowly and eventually—well.—The Furrow.

QUARANTINE HALTS DISEASE

To protect healthy swine herds against the introduction of infectious abortion, all newly purchased open gilts and sows, as well as boars, even though appearing healthy, should be quarantined for 30 or 60 days followed by a blood test.

According to the department of animal pathology and hygiene, University of Illinois College of Agriculture, spread of the disease may be checked by applying the blood test to all animals purchased at private or public sales. Newly purchased bred sows should be kept in quarantine until they have farrowed and prove negative to agglutination tests afterward.—Better Farm Equipment and Methods.

Danger Ahead in Short Term Credit

Prices of farm products rose 5 points last month and the index stands at 203. The prices of things farmers buy did not increase, and as a result prices received by farmers averaged 117 per cent of parity, which was 3 points above last month.

Short-term credit has become an essential tool on most of the modern operated farms. The best information available indicates that farmers in the United States increased their short-term debts outstanding to commercial banks and federally-sponsored agencies from \$29.8 million on July 1, 1939, to \$45.5 million on July 1, 1944, or about 50 per cent. In the same period, Virginia farmers increased their short-term obligations outstanding to those sources of credit from \$20.4 million to \$26.9 million, or 32 per cent. In the spring of 1944, the farmers in Virginia had outstanding short-term obligations of \$29.8 million to commercial banks (federally-sponsored agencies had not been established.) On July 31, 1948, farmers in the State were estimated to owe commercial banks \$34.8 million. Thus, an increase of 21 per cent occurred during World War I. The similarity between events in that period and the present is disturbing. By January 1, 1921, it was estimated that Virginia farmers had further increased their short-term debts outstanding to banks to \$52.7 million, or 39 per cent in 29 months. About 60 per cent on the total increase came after the shooting stopped.

A lack of things to buy has probably been the most important factor in holding down the farmers' short-term borrowings so far. Wants and needs are accumulating, and it is quite likely that the real danger of a boom in operating credit for farmers lies just ahead. With farm machinery, washing machines, radios, autos, refrigerators, and so forth, on a ration-free market, and continued good prices for farm products, the trend in short-term borrowings by farmers will likely follow that of World War I into the postwar period. Should the rate of increase continue to exceed that of a quarter of a century ago, the total rise in short-term credit will be well above anything now anticipated.

About two years after that last war many banks, farm supply dealers, merchants, and others found they were greatly over-extended on short-term farm paper. Some tried to get more collateral behind their loans. Others feared falling prices and liquidated the security of their borrowers. The stampede spread and all parties took losses which could probably have been avoided. Incidentally, the resulting chaos was largely responsible for the establishment of some Federally sponsored credit agencies which exist today. Free credit is the best, though most seldom used, antidote for these problems. To the extent that history repeats, there is danger ahead. It should be remembered that credit is a most ruthless master.—Prepared in the Department of Agricultural Economics at V. P. I. by Harry M. Love, of Farm Finance.

Increase Legume Seed Production

Farmers will receive special acreage payments as an inducement to harvest legume seed in a program announced by the War Food Administration. In addition, payments of 2½ cents per pound will be made for alfalfa and alsike clover seed, and 3½ cents per pound for red clover seed, harvested and sold into commercial channels before December 31, 1945.

The program will be administered by state and county offices of the Agricultural Adjustment Agency. The Agricultural Appropriation Act for the coming fiscal year includes \$12,500,000 to stimulate red clover, alfalfa and alsike seed production. The need for legume seed this year is particularly acute, says N. E. Dodd, Chief of the AAA. With last year's production below expectations due to unfavorable weather, and with needs in European countries especially great, there is an extra demand on United States farmers this year. Estimates are that European countries will need 20 million pounds of red clover seed this year, as well as 5 million pounds of alfalfa and 3 million pounds of alsike clover seed.

Domestic needs for legume seeds also are greater than normal because of the present excessive drain on soils and the need for good hay. Legumes plowed under help maintain productivity of the soil by offsetting soil losses resulting from the forced effort to meet war demands.
