REMARKS

"It was my intention to follow the example of the majority of my predecessors and present you on this your annual election, the clippings taken from the year's newspapers, however, upon mature reflection I have decided that just to give you these compilings is in too limited a measure a recognition of the office you have conferred upon me: so it becomes my duty and pleasure to make a departure - even if I reflect upon my own competency. In passing I will say that the past year has been very bountiful of newspaper articles relative to the great war between the states and the trend is to keep before the public all historical facts and personal reminiscences, knowing as time goes on prejudice gives way to toleration, and thus gather up every thing authentic for history's sake: a sifting as it were to get the true from the false.

I could give many incidents, but by so doing, the attempt might be regarded as vain and egotistic, rather than for your profit and improvement, so I forbear and pass on to what is more to my taste. Now it has never occurred to me to tell you anything about how, when or where battles were fought, fearing I would invite such criticism as to call forth your condemnation instead of congratulation, but I am before you to emphasize a fact so well known to you how we were helped in that struggle of 4 years by the Irish, our adopted citizens. I know you will pardon me in making this attempt if I give you a little of Ireland's history - as it is simply to convince you how conspicuously, the Irish have always fought - and with these dear men from the land of song and story, bravery is inborn. It is Ireland's pride to rate as one of the oldest countries, and as far back as can be traced she has given to the world some of the best statesmen, its grandest orators, and last though not least - soldiers of such valor and heroism as to elicit the gratitude and admiration wherever they have fought. However, in order to be brief I will only follow the Irish war record for about 100 years, leaving everything previous as tradition. It was said when recruiting was going on for Waterloo, a national song, the drum and pipe etc, could so fire the hearts of the Irish lads, that they rushed forward in countless numbers, leaving behind them distressed homes and when that battle was fought, it meant not only untold glory for the Irish soldiers but a desolated country and broken hearts, for few returned to tell the tale, yet every one knew and Wellington said, the Irish won that immortal day. Later on when nearly a half century had passed, we find the Irish fighting as of yore, and the great Carriacoo war added fresh laurels to their reputation for bravery. Another half century and it is now in the Boer-African war, they are ever to the front, their Queen saw fit to call for a general wearing of the green on St Patrick's day, and the next thing she visited Ireland to show her entire appreciation and approval of these brave subjects.

I have briefly sketched the Irish as fighters and I am here to say how we of the South should hold in grateful remembrance, their assistance, for we needed just such material, not that we lacked bravery among our own men, but as our generals frequently declared that the environments of our soldiers both at camp and at home were most depressing - and despondency was a greater foe to fight than the enemy on the battlefield. Our soldiers miserably clad, worse fed, felt the need of good, hearty, buoyant comrades and the Irish helped beyond reckoning - for what is more inspiring than the three B's - the sweet-blarney, the dear brogue and the funny blunders - the factors of the Irish make-up, were all very telling and helpful. So from Sumter to surrender we had the Irish to assist us and many instances of great valor are noted. I will mention the gallant Goul O'Leary and could give the names of many more. We know the tenderest chords were touched when the Irish poet-priest, Father Ryan wrote in sweetest poetry of our rights and wrongs.

In conclusion I will give you one of the most haunting memories of the war: it is that of the face of a dear old Irishman made white and weary by the news of the surrender - grieved in its gloom and greatness - in gloom because he had seen his hopes dashed to the ground - in greatness in his beautiful acquiescence - knowing his days were numbered and it would be denied him to enjoy a new Southland: that man's daughter is your historian."

Loudon County, Virginia April 1st 1914.</p> <p>"I resigned as Passed Assistant Surgeon in the U.S. Navy when Virginia seceded, and was appointed surgeon in the Confederate Navy in April 1861 and ordered to the Confederate States Steamship 'Sumter' at New Orleans, upon which vessel I served until she was laid up at Gibraltar in 1862. I returned with Admiral Semmes to Nassau in order to take passage in a blockade runner for home, when the admiral met orders there to return to England for service on the 'Alabama'. On getting there we found that she had preceded us, by a short interval, to the Azore islands. We took passage in a merchant vessel for that point, found the "Alabama" awaiting us and Admiral Semmes then took command of her, with some other officers, and there began our eventful career. After a two years cruise finding the ship in great need of repairs, it was returned and anchored at Cherbourg, on the French coast. There the United States steamer 'Kearsage' found us, a contest resulted and our brave craft was sunk. Those of the crew who were saved returned to Southampton, whence Lieutenant Kree, who had been the executive of the 'Alabama', and myself went to Liverpool and sailed for Halifax, Nova Scotia, and thence to Bermuda, taking passage from there in the blockade runner 'Flamingo' for Wilmington, North Carolina. From the last named place I made my way to Richmond, Virginia and reported to the Navy Department, and, after a month's furlough, was ordered to the heavy Navy Batteries below Drewry's Bluff and upon the retreat from Richmond was temporarily placed under Commodore Tucker, (who was then commanding at Drewry's Bluff) and was assigned with his command to General Gustis Lee's Division, and followed the fortunes of the C. S. Army to Appomattox, where I was paroled and made my way to Lynchburg joining my father's (Major John Minson Galt, of the C. S. Quarter Master Department) family who were living in Lynchburg, and so rounded up my career as sailor and foot soldier.</p> <p>I refer for further details to Arthur Sinclair's "Two Years on the Alabama" and to Semmes "Memories of Service Afloat" both of which will give pleasant and eventful memories of our experiences."</p> <p>— Engagement between the Merrimac, (Virginia) and the Monitor (U.S.) took place Sunday, March 9th, 1862. Monitor foundered at sea Dec. 31, 1862.</p>
