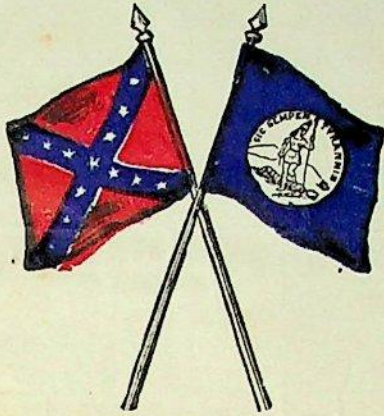

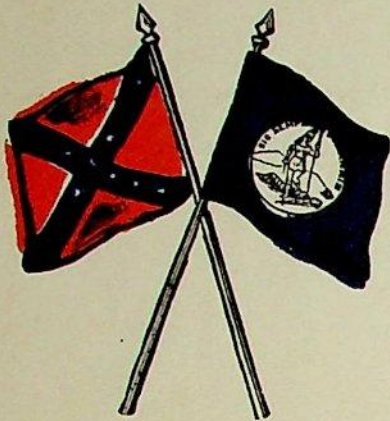

RECORD OF SERVICES.

I was a member of a Volunteer Company, called "Creston Grays", organized near my home at Gladys Virginia - Adam Levent was Captain, my brother J. A. Robson, first Lieut. James Conually, second Lieut. and Howard Withers, third Lieut. - We were mustered into service in Lynchburg Va on May 16, 1861 - We were sent from there to Manassas and assigned to Gen. Songstreet's Brigade - Under him we fought the battle of "Bull Run" - We were then transferred to "Kemper's Brigade", Pickett's Division. We were in the "Seven Days Battle" around Richmond

Yorktown and the Peninsular
The next engagement was
battle of "Frazier's Farm"; here
I was wounded, taken prisoner
and sent to Governor's Island
New York, for a short time,
then over to Fort Mifflin
where I remained 30 days,
sick and wounded and suffered
intensely for the comforts of
home life. - After 30 days
I was exchanged for a
Yankee - When I returned,
I was appointed "Ordnance
Sergeant". Near Farmville
the Yankees attacked us
captured our wagons and
team, burnt the wagons
and took the horses for their
own use. - From here I went
home, this happened only
a day or two before General
Lee's surrender. -

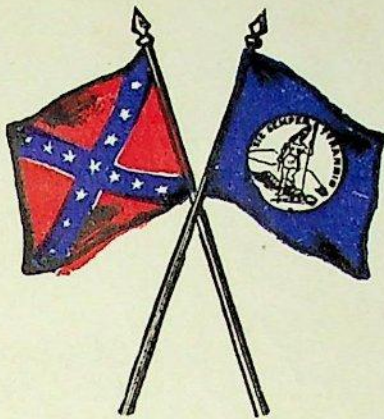

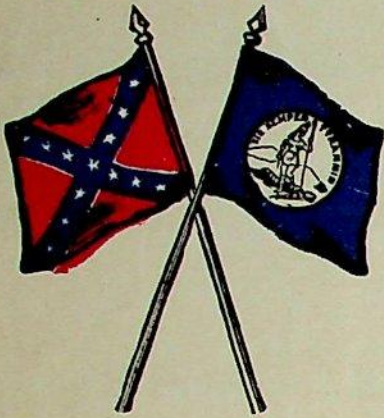

Section 1. Those women entitled to membership are the women who are the widows, wives, mothers, sisters, nieces, grand nieces, and lineal descendants of such men as served honorably in the Confederate army, navy, or civil service; or of those men, unfit for active duty, who loyally gave aid to the Cause. Also Southern women who can give proof of personal service or loyal aid to the Southern Cause during the war; and the lineal descendants or nieces of such women, wherever living. Northern women having no male relatives who served the Confederate States of America in the War between the States, 1861-1865, having themselves performed no special services to same, but having married a Confederate soldier since 1865, and through this means becoming a member of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, shall have the words "by adoption" placed upon their certificates of membership, and upon the Registrar's books, and in all rosters shall be designated as members "by adoption." Said member being entitled to all the honors and privileges of this Association except that of holding any office in the General Association, divisions, or chapters; except that of transmitting this honor to members of her family, only her children of a Confederate father. The honor dies with her if she has no children.
