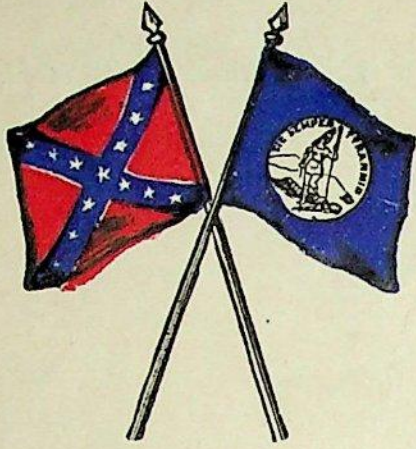

RECORD OF SERVICES

Dr. W. F. Abbitt in 1861 entered the service as Captain of Co. B. 46th Va. Reg. In August 1862 he was wounded and an attack of typhoid fever which was very severe. ^{followed this} He was brought to his home in Appomattox County, Va.

In 1863 he returned to the army and he was put on "The physician's examining board," where he served until the close of the war.

After Dr. Abbitt was taken home the next two succeeding captains of his Co. were killed and then his brother Gen. W. Abbitt was made Capt., & served until the close of the war. The first Capt. who was killed was

Capt. Kammah, & the second was
Capt. Jennings Wise son of Gov.
N. A. Wise. Capt. Wise was killed
~~and~~ at Roanoke Island & then
Capt. Geo. W. Abbitt succeeded
him.

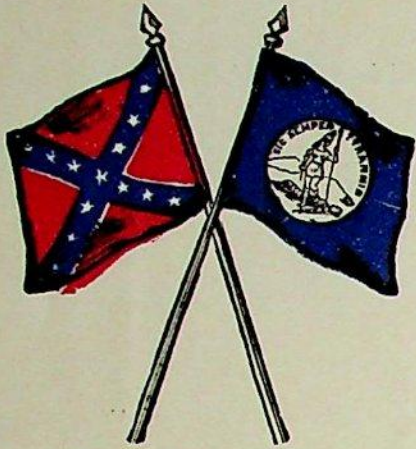

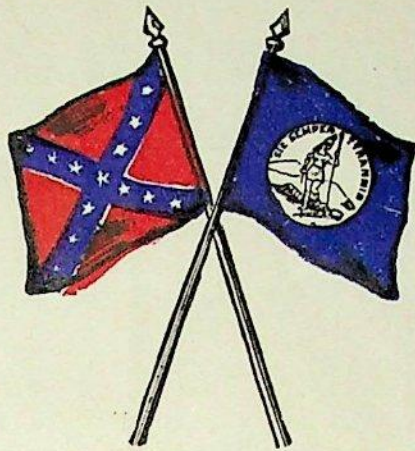
RECORD OF SERVICES

Smith Edward and Dabney Tweedy of Campbell county Va, volunteered at the beginning of the war and were members of Co. "C" 11th Va. Reg. Kemper's brigade, Pickett's Division, and Longstreet's Corps. They were engaged in the following battles: "Wilderness" "1st Manassas" "2nd Manassas" "Williamsburg" "Seven Days fight around Richmond" "The Crater" and "Gettysburg." Smith & Edward, were injured & also wounded, but not seriously. Dabney Tweedy was killed at Gettysburg. Robert Tweedy brother of the above volunteered as a private in an infantry company of his Co. His Capt. was killed and they succeeded him, but was killed the following day by a Federal sharp-shooter at "Sajlofs Creek" near Petersburg Va. Rolfe Tweedy on account of youth volunteered in 1862 in a cavalry Co. of his county & fought until the close of the war.

My father Jerry Sears died before the war, and my widowed mother & her children lived with her parents Allen & M. A. Treedy & my grand-mother & mother served & nursed for the Confederate soldiers, and all of us helped to nurse sick & wounded soldiers brought to our home.

Northern women having no male relatives who served the Confederate States of America in the War between the States, 1861-1865, having themselves performed no special services to same, but having married a Confederate soldier since 1865, and through this means becoming a member of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, shall have the words "by adoption" placed upon their certificates of membership, and upon the Registrar's books, and in all rosters shall be designated as members "by adoption." Said member being entitled to all the honors and privileges of this Association except that of holding any office in the General Association, divisions, or chapters; except that of transmitting this honor to members of her family, only her children of a Confederate father. The honor dies with her if she has no children.

Francis Lorraine, Keilley enlisted in the services of the Southern Confederacy in the Spring of 1861. He united with the Dawson, (Capt. Co. C. of the 3rd Ga. Regiment) whose Captain was R. L. McWhorter, and whose regiment was under Gen. A. R. Wright. A year from that time the regiment was re-organized and James Geer was made Captain of the Co. which still in Wright's regiment, was placed in Anderson's Division, Longstreet's Corps.

He was a gallant soldier and rose from the ranks, to a 1st Lieutenantcy and died on the field of battle, or was so wounded that he died in a few hours after a battle at Front Royal Va. on the 23rd of July, 1863. He was with Gen. R. E. Lee in most of important battles of the Army of Northern Va. up to the terrible battle of Gettysburg.

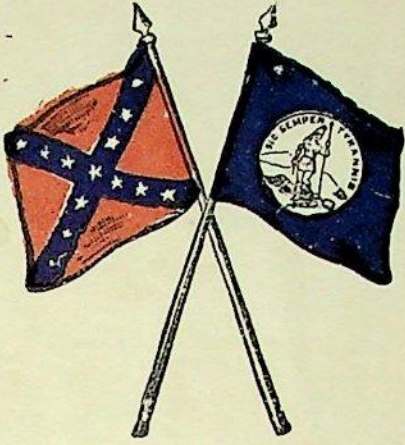
