Major Stump's Work Praised At Fla. Separation Center

How Major Arthur E. Stump of Lynchburg directed the transformation of a once bleak separation center into one of the brightest spots at Camp Blanding, Fla., is described in the current issue of the post's newspaper.

Written by staff workers, the story relates that when Maj. Stump took over the long unused separation area, he was faced with "seemingly insurmountable problems."

From a handful of men, his detachment grew until it numbers now more than 900, and his area has been termed "one of the finest and best equipped in the camp."

Walkways have been built to connect all buildings, white fences and cedar rail fences have been erected, lawns have been seeded and parking areas have been marked out.

"The detachment's day rooms, the most colorless to be found a few months ago, now have a pool table, ping pong table, reading lamps, comfortable chairs, a reserve supply of games and playing cards, plenty of books and magazines and, most important of all, its own private barber who is on duty all day and each evening," the story states. "Plenty of athletic equipment for organized

sports has been added to the property list."

Partly in celebration of the work, a Christmas party with dancing, food and entertainment was held at the center December 21.

Stump Appointed Executive Head Of Reserve Group

Lt. Col. Arthur E. Stump, Jr., USAFR, of 415 Rivermont avenue, has been appointed executive officer of a group including the local 9478th volunteer air reserve squadron, which is composed of Lynchburg area men, S/Sgt. Louis Toth, Jr., representative of the air force at the Lynchburg recruiting station, reported yesterday.

Col. Stump, a member of the 9478th squadron, is manager of the Life Insurance Company of Virginia, with offices here.

He is a 1932 graduate of E. C. Glass High School, received his bachelor of science degree from Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1936, and was commissioned a second lieutenant in the army reserve.

A World War II veteran, he was called to active duty as a lieutenant in August, 1941, and reported for duty at Fort Monroe.

As a captain he received two commendations from the war department for his work at Gunter Field, Ala., and for his success in recruiting men.

His last wartime duty was as commanding officer of the reception center at Fort Bragg, N. C. He reverted to an inactive status in January, 1947.

Col. Stump will not be called to active duty in connection with his new assignment as group executive officer. The group has its headquarters in Roanoke.

Lieut. Edward Tyree Killed In Belgium On January 3

Believed To Have Been At Bastogne; Other Deaths Here

First Lieut. Edward Christian Glass Tyree, 29, paratrooper, U.S.A., was killed in action January 3 in Belgium, according to a message received from the War Department yesterday morning by his wife, Mrs. Morrie Macleod Tyree of 612 Riverside drive.

Lieutenant Tyree is believed to have been at Bastogne. Letters recently received by members of the family were written on the day he was killed and in one of them was the word, underscored, NUTS, intimating where he had been.

Besides his wife, who is living with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William T. Macleod, he is survived by two sons, Edward C. G. Tyree, Jr., and Walter Preston Tyree, II.

Lieutenant Tyree's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Walter P. Tyree, 26 Easton avenue, and the following

sisters also survive him: Mrs. John G. Potts and Mrs. Randolph W. Hudson, both of Lynchburg, Mrs. Latham Bruenig of Indianapolis, Ind., and Mrs. Hunter Faulconer of Charlottesville.

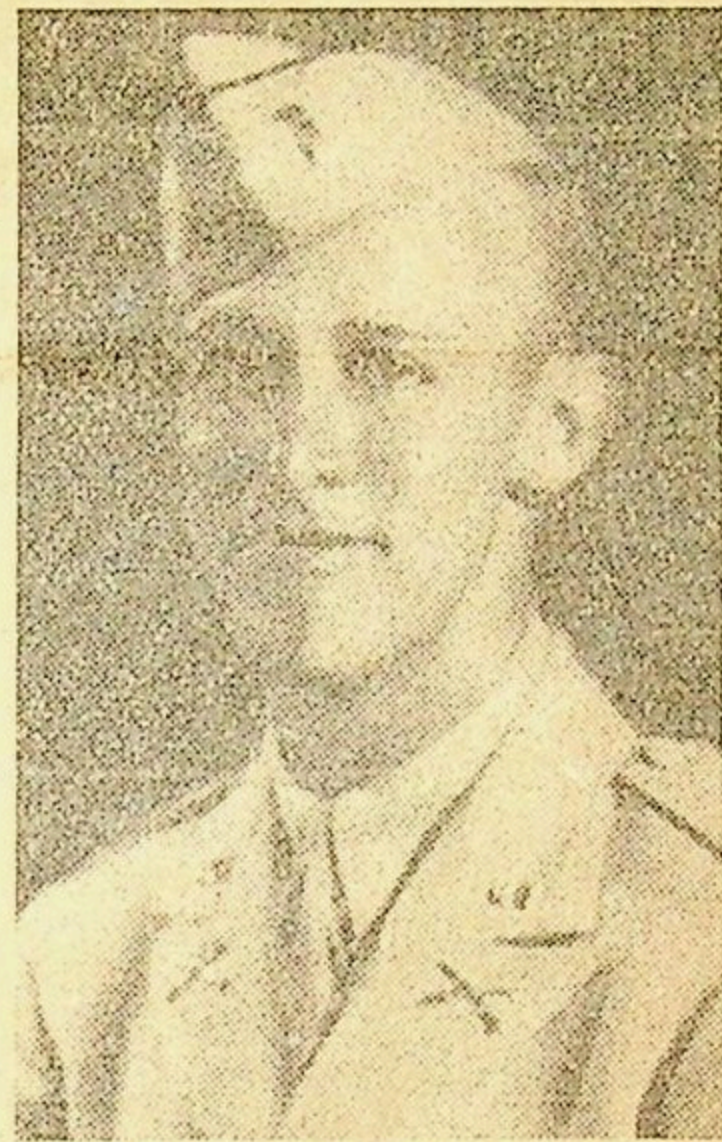
He was the nephew of E. C. Glass, Jr., of route 4, Robert Glass, Mrs. Nancy Glass Mayfield and Miss Elizabeth Glass, all of Lynchburg, Mrs. Henry Lee of Amherst, and Mrs. Edward Bell of Lynchburg, and Mrs. Charles Almond of Richmond.

Lieut. Tyree was the grandson of the late Dr. Edward Christian Glass, for many years superintendent of Lynchburg public schools.

He enlisted in the Army June 17, 1942, as an officer candidate and was commissioned second lieutenant in the cavalry at Fort Riley, Kans., September 20 of that year. He later transferred to Fort Benning, Ga., for training as a paratrooper and was promoted to first lieutenant in February, 1944.

Wounded in Holland last October, Lieutenant Tyree soon returned to active duty after treatment in a hospital in England.

Born in Lynchburg in January, 1915, he was a graduate of E. C. Glass High School and studied at the Corcoran School of Art, Washington. Before entering the serv-

ice, he held a position with Export Leaf Tobacco company.

Posthumous Award

1/Lt. Edward Christian Glass Tyree has been posthumously awarded the Bronze Star Medal by direction of the President, for "heroic achievement in action," his wife, Mrs. Morriel M. Tyree, 612 Riverside drive, has been informed in a letter from the War Department, dated August 15.

Lt. Tyree, with the Parachute Infantry, was killed in action January 3, 1945, in Belgium.

The citation signed by Maj.-Gen. Edward F. Witsell, acting adjutant general reads:

"For distinguishing himself by heroic achievement in action. On Jan. 3, 1945, in the vicinity of

(censored) his platoon was attacked by large forces of enemy infantry and six tanks, forcing the unit on his left to withdraw. Although the area was covered by heavy enemy artillery, tank and small arms fire, Lt. Tyree organized both his own men and the unit on his left. He proceeded to the left flank outpost where he personally repaired wire communication and prepared to meet the enemy threat.

"During the assault, Lt. Tyree handled his men so skillfully that the enemy attack was completely repulsed. Lt. Tyree personally accounted for three enemy dead and directed fire which destroyed one enemy tank. Throughout the attack, his platoon accounted for at least 100 enemy casualties. In the latter phases of the engagement, Lt. Tyree was mortally wounded by enemy fire. His actions were in accordance with the highest standards of the military service."

Samuel William Tyree, Jr. educated in
Lynchburg, Virginia, public schools.
On October 3, 1934 he joined the
Civilian Conservation Corps - and on
March 13, 1935 he received an
honorable discharge.

In October 1937 he entered the service
of the United States Army and
was assigned to the Chemical
Warfare Service at Edgewood
Arsenal at Edgewood, Maryland.
After receiving a specialist's rating at
Edgewood Arsenal, he was transferred
to Barksdale Field, Louisiana in
February 1940, where he took further
training, and in September 1940
was transferred to McDill Field,
Tampa, Florida, being connected

with the Tenth Air Force.

On March 19, 1942, as Staff Sergeant
he sailed from Charleston, South
Carolina for India, where he is
now stationed (Feb. 1, 1943).
