

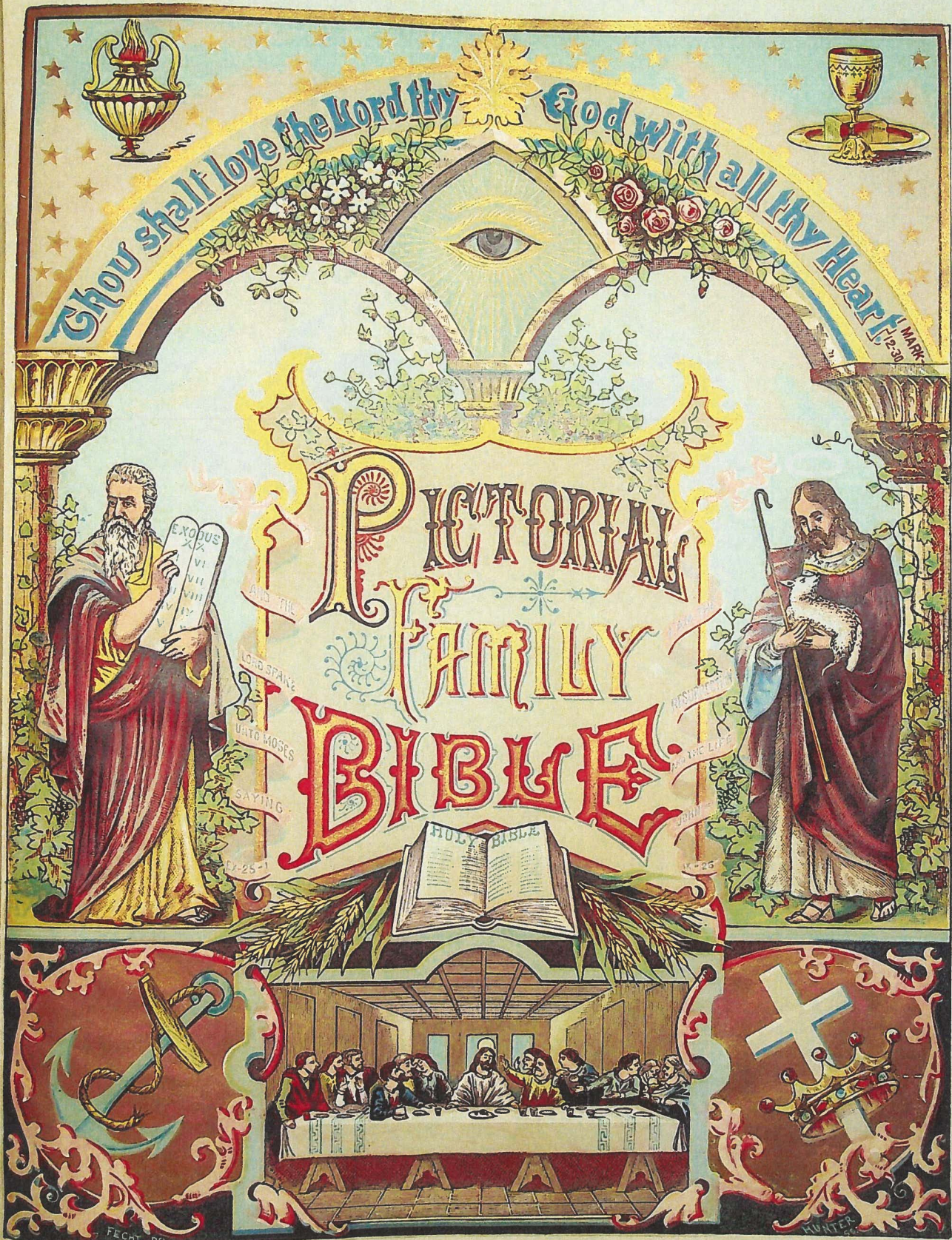

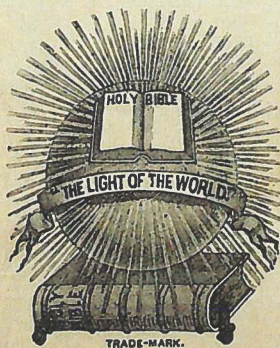

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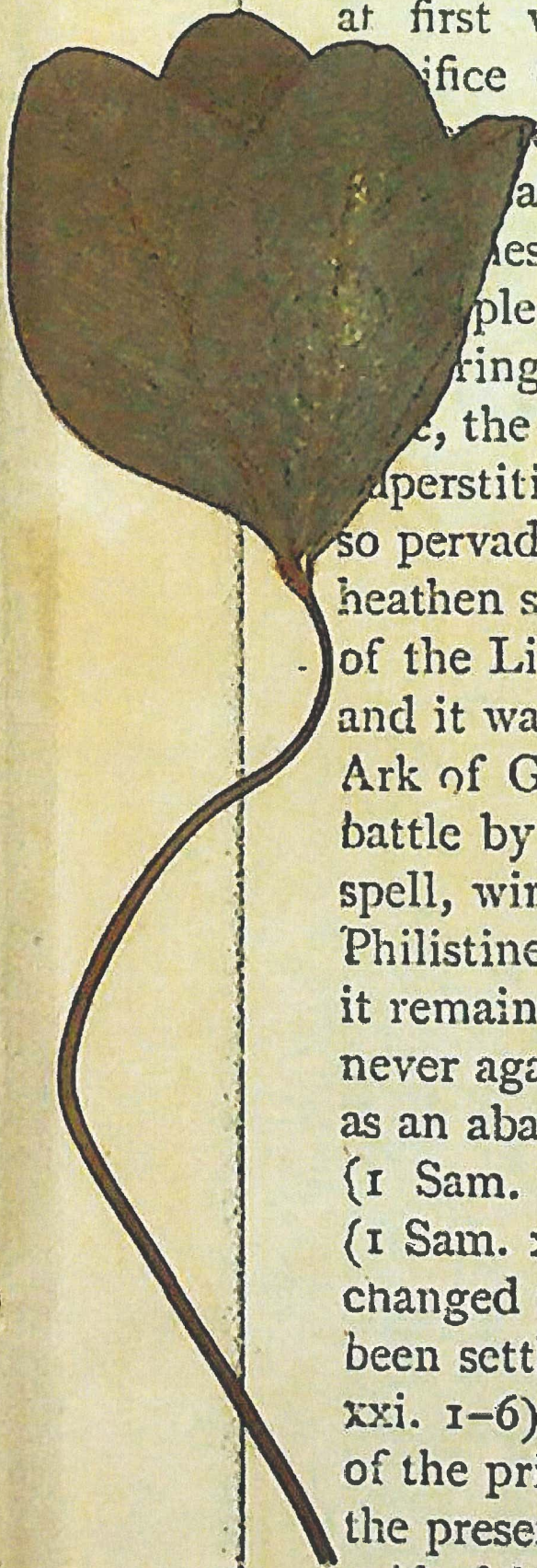
DEATH OF MRS. HARVEY.

Mrs. Salina Victoria Harvey, who made her home at Mrs. Berta Blankinship's, passed away yesterday afternoon at 3:15 o'clock, after an illness of several months. She was the widow of Mr. Hillary T. Harvey, who preceded her to the grave eleven years ago. She was born in Appomattox seventy-two years ago, and was the daughter of Mr. Harvey H. Paulette and Mrs. Jane Clark Paulette. Mrs. Harvey resided for a number of years in Danville, and moved to Lynchburg only about six years ago, but in this short time she had endeared herself to many in this city by her loving, sympathetic, Christian character. She was an adherent of the Swedenborgian faith, and is survived by the following children: Mrs. Berta Blankinship, of Lynchburg; Mr. C. K. Harvey, of Norfolk; Mr. Byron Harvey, of Nashville; Mrs. Lula Tarry, of Richmond; Mr. E. M. Harvey, of Norfolk; Mrs. Hettie Hutson, of Danville; Mr. Harry Harvey and Mrs. Gilchrist, of Lynchburg. Besides these, she leaves behind many sorrowing relatives and friends who mourn on account of the loss sustained by her death.

The remains will be conveyed to Danville tomorrow morning, leaving the Union depot here on No. 19 passenger train at 8:38 o'clock. The funeral will take place from the Danville depot immediately after the arrival of the train and the interment will be in Green Hill cemetery.

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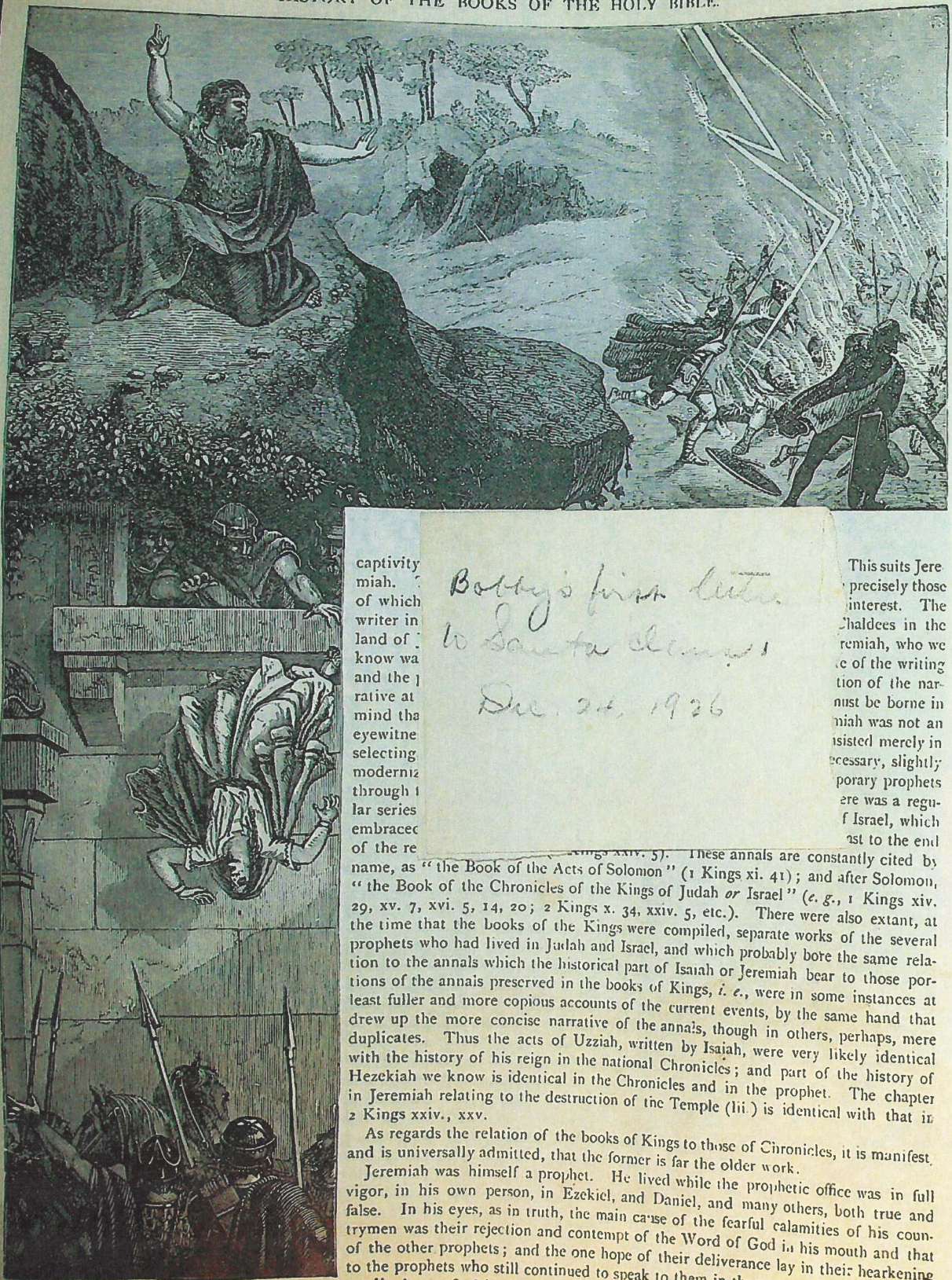

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name, as "the Book of the Acts of Solomon" (1 Kings xi. 41); and after Solomon, "the Book of the Chronicles of the Kings of Judah or Israel" (e. g., 1 Kings xiv. 29, xv. 7, xvi. 5, 14, 20; 2 Kings x. 34, xxiv. 5, etc.). There were also extant, at the time that the books of the Kings were compiled, separate works of the several prophets who had lived in Judah and Israel, and which probably bore the same relation to the annals which the historical part of Isaiah or Jeremiah bear to those portions of the annals preserved in the books of Kings, i. e., were in some instances at least fuller and more copious accounts of the current events, by the same hand that drew up the more concise narrative of the annals, though in others, perhaps, were duplicates. Thus the acts of Uzziah, written by Isaiah, were very likely identical with the history of his reign in the national Chronicles; and part of the history of Hezekiah we know is identical in the Chronicles and in the prophet. The chapter in Jeremiah relating to the destruction of the Temple (lii) is identical with that in 2 Kings xxiv., xxv.

As regards the relation of the books of Kings to those of Chronicles, it is manifest, and is universally admitted, that the former is far the older work.

Jeremiah was himself a prophet. He lived while the prophetic office was in full vigor, in his own person, in Ezekiel, and Daniel, and many others, both true and false. In his eyes, as in truth, the main cause of the fearful calamities of his countrymen was their rejection and contempt of the Word of God in his mouth and that to the prophets who still continued to speak to them in the name of the Lord. Accordingly, we find in the book of Kings prominence given to the prophetic office

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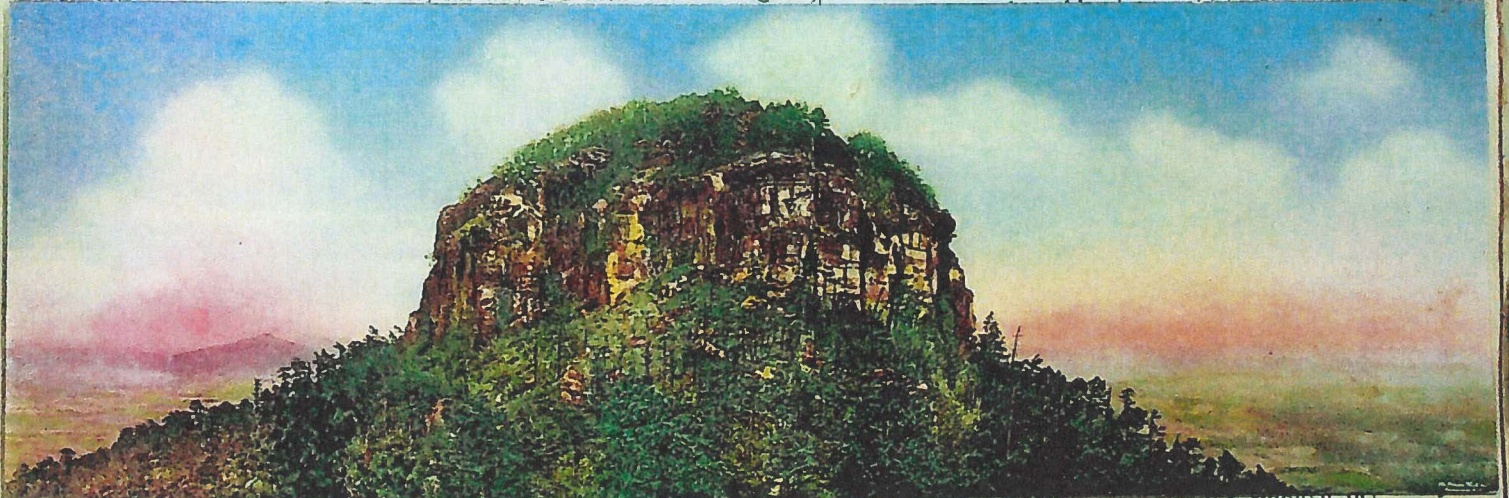
