Uncle Aubrey Blankinship Dies

Aubrey (Uncle Aubrey) Blankinship who was Maintenance Department head when he retired in 1949 died Friday, January 24, in Lynchburg General Hospital. He was 74.

Mr. Blankinship started with

Craddock-Terry as secretary to John W. Craddock, one of the founders. He left the company for awhile but returned in January 1923.

He was a member of the arrangements committee for the Lakeside Outing in August 1937 and was editor of THE PICNICKER which Craddock-Terry published to record that event.

Mr. Blankinship was a man who loved his work and his Company. When he retired in June 1949 he said:

"Our Company is not just a place where we can go to do some work to get some money. It is an institution. It has furnished the means by which, not just a few, but thousands of people have fed their babies, sheltered, clothed and raised and educated their families into worthy citizenship, and furnished and bought their homes."

He thought highly of the people with whom he worked and in that same talk said:

"The greatest asset of this institution is in the character of its people, and that has always been high. As I look back through the years, memories of many of them come back to me. And then come memories of Mr. John Craddock, Mr. Abe Craddock, and Mr. Terry, and especially of Mr. John."

Mr. Blankinship was a member of an Episcopal Church in Roanoke.

He is survived by a son, William A. Blankinship of Jessup, Md.; a daughter, Mrs. Howard Crawford of Albertville, Ala., and two grandchildren.

Also surviving are: three brothers: Russell E. Blankinship and Julian A. Blankinship, both of Lynchburg, and Harvey P. Blankinship of Washington, and two sisters, Mrs. Fred Gentile of Forestville, Conn., and Mrs. L. G. Wofford of Lynchburg.

Funeral services were held at 3:30 p. m. Monday, January 27, at Diuguid Memorial Chapel. Burial was in Spring Hill Cemetery.
