Since Miss Hunter's death, decision has been made to place Mrs. Sallie Ellis Davies on the beneficiary list, a motion was made (carried) that she be given five dollars (\$5.00) a month, until September.

Changes in the Constitution were discussed, a motion was made (carried) to appoint a com. on an auditor for the Chapter.

 Mrs. Erwin's and Mrs. Davis's
 papers had been returned and
 filed, but certificates had not
 arrived, as yet. Blanks
 have been sent Miss Kathleen
 Gilbert at request of Mrs. Gouger.
 The Nathan S. Forest Circle,
 Mrs. Washburn, Chr. Mrs. Cass
 Wood, acting in her absence,
 had charge of the program.
 Mrs. Chas. Hall gave two
 numbers, with Mrs. Kay at
 the piano, Mrs. E. N. Will
 gave an address on:
 "The Symbolical 600" in
 a very interesting manner,
 and displayed the badge
 of that organization.
 Mrs. Wiggins read a

 Hazy, Fayetteville, Pa. (editor

The minutes of the April meeting were read and approved. The president read a letter from Mrs. J. L. Bugg asking the chapter for a contribution to the fund being raised for a new organ to be placed in the Lee Chapel at Lexington. It was voted to send \$1.00, the president stating that \$1.00 had already been paid, thus making a total contribution of \$2.00.
