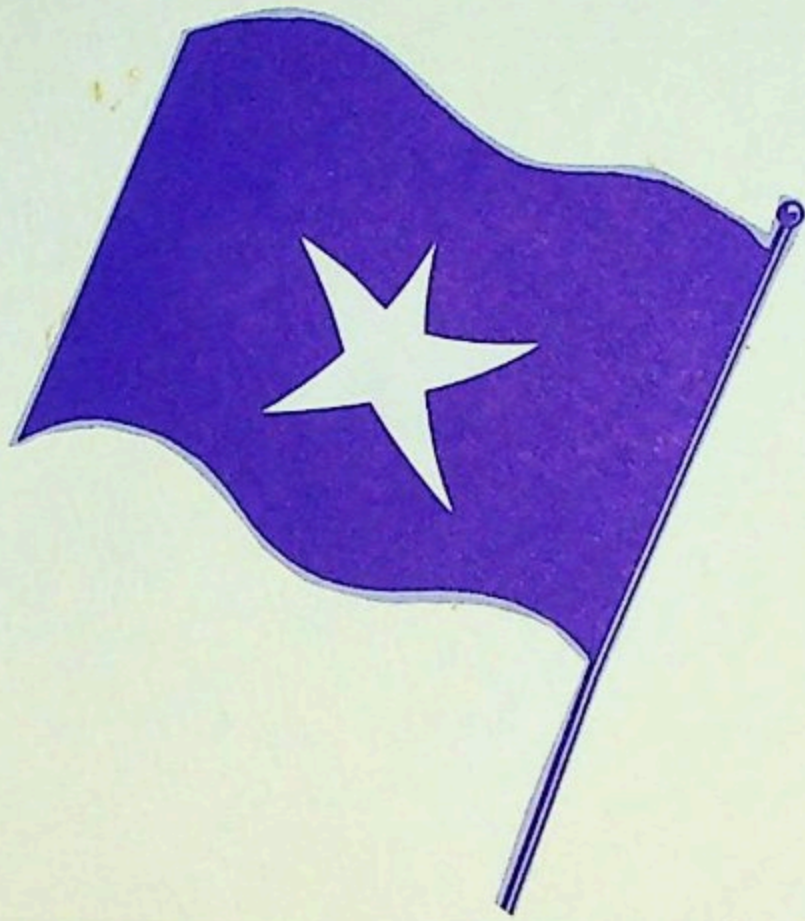

Drop arm completely after pledge.

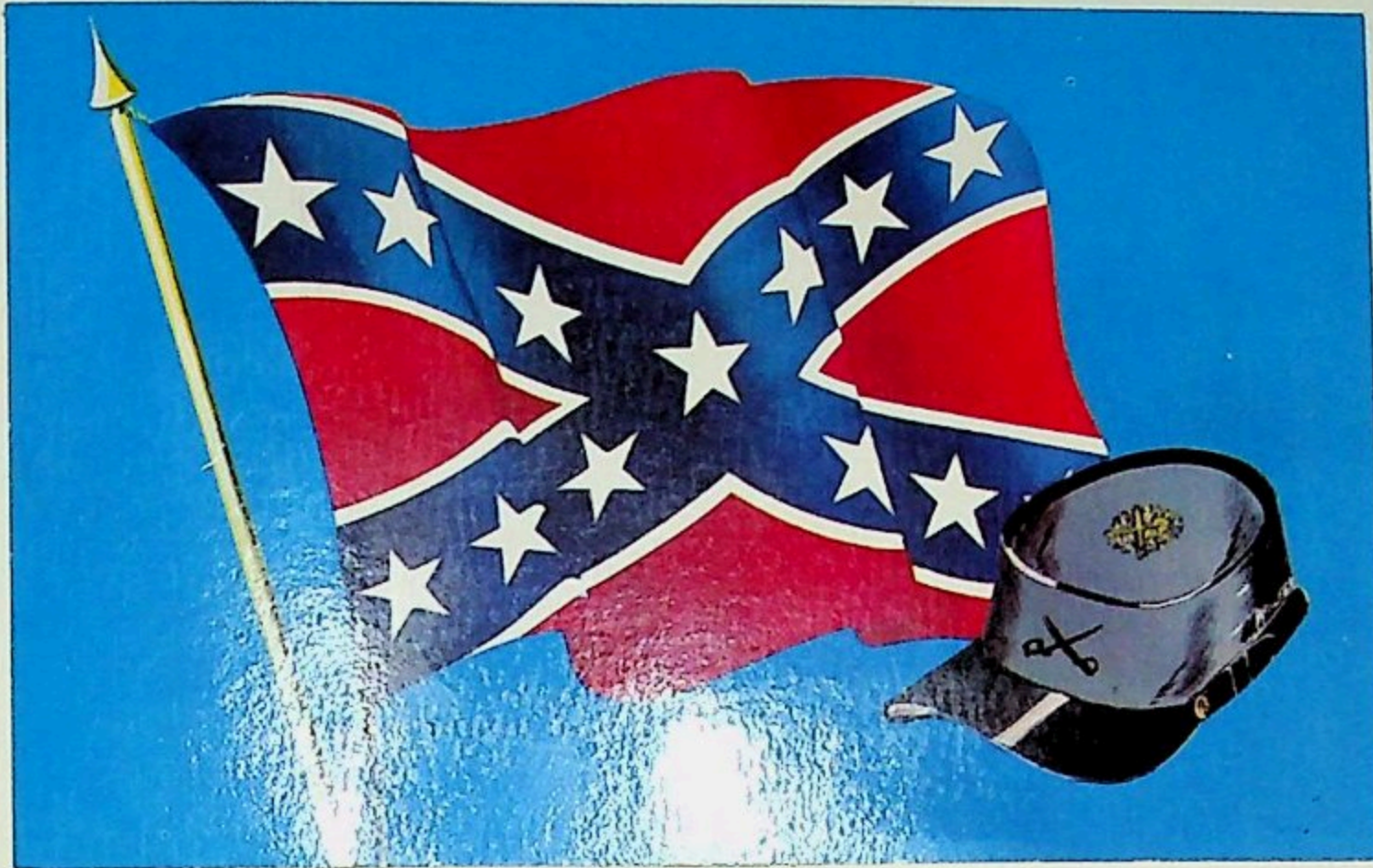

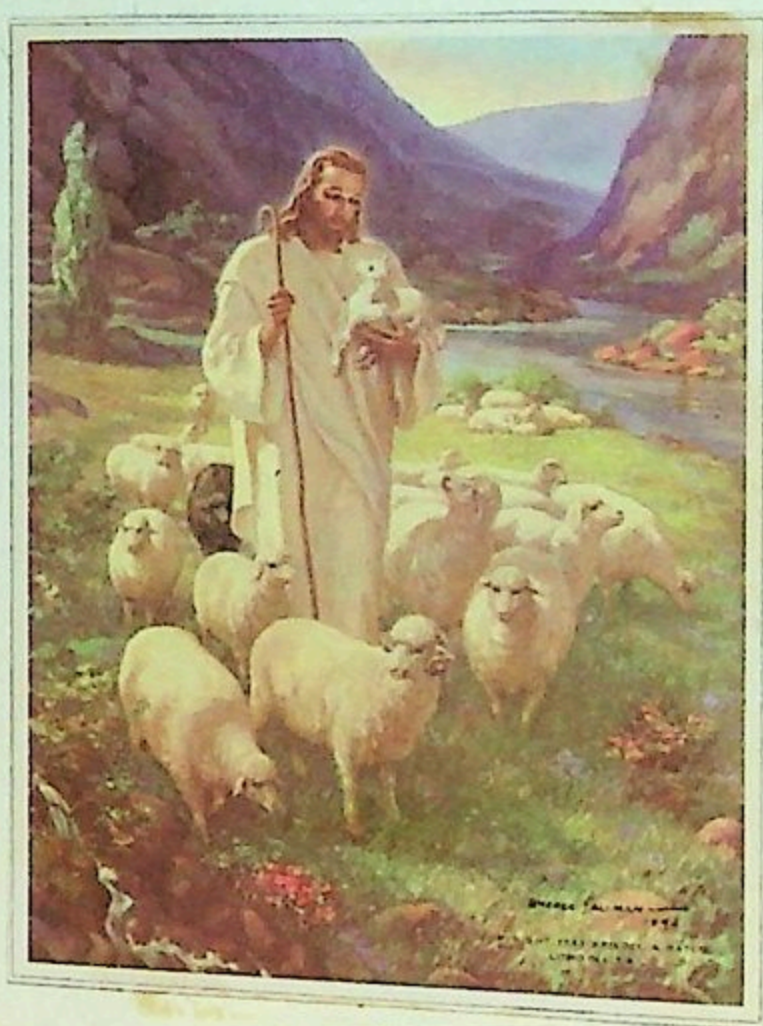
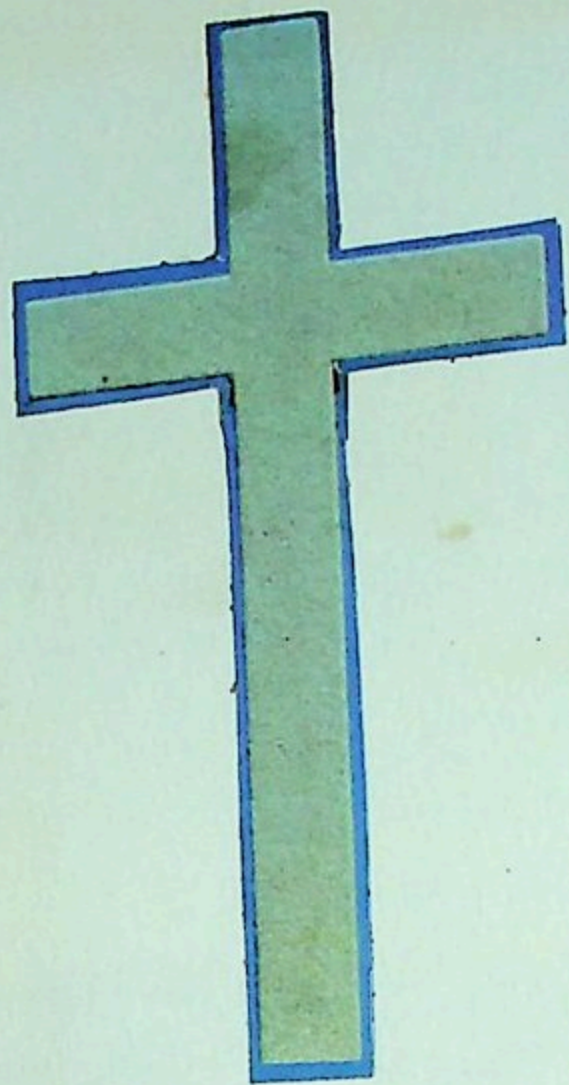

The family will be at the residence, and at the funeral home from 7 to 9 p.m. Wednesday.

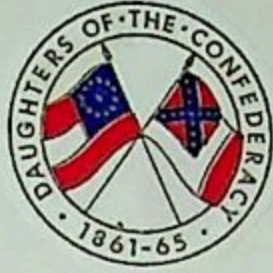


Dear Miss Burgess:

## History-education stressed at Old Dominion UDC meet

History and education were stressed at the meeting of the Old Dominion Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy at the home of Mrs. G. C. Wood of Rustburg on Sept. 8. The Matthew Fontaine Maury Circle, of which Mrs. Wood is chairman, was hostess for the meeting.

The chapter historian, Katharine Gilbert, gave a history of the Old Dominion Chapter, which was the second UDC group in Lynchburg. The late Ruth H. Early was instrumental in forming the group and she sent out a message in April, 1896, which read as follows:

"... As several ladies have expressed a desire for the formation of another chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, I hereby beg that you will attend a meeting at the YMCA building at 5:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, June 23, for conference in reference to reorganization..."

Miss Gilbert said 15 appeared and many of them were members of the Lucy Minor Oley Chapter, now the Kirkwood Oley Chapter. Miss Early was temporary chairman and officers of the chapter were named as follows: Mrs. Charles E. Heald, president; Maria Walker, first vice president; Miss Early, second vice president; Mrs. Davis Christian, secretary, and Mrs. William H. Jones, treasurer.

The speaker told of the work of the organization through the years and its contribution to the city and to the history of the Confederacy.

Mrs. J. L. Jones gave a report on scholarships offered to lineal descendants of those who served in the CSA. She said that more than 500 scholarships were given last year throughout the country in the name of the UDC.

Receiving membership certificates were Mrs. E. F. Cheatham, Mrs. A. F. Hek, Mrs. Percy V. Kirby and Alice Evelyn Bell. Three new members were welcomed. They were Elizabeth Robertson, Elizabeth Harris and Mrs. C. H. Ward.

Election of delegates to the Virginia Division UDC convention at Hotel Roanoke, Oct. 5-7 and to the General Convention in Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 6-12 was held.

Attending the Roanoke sessions will be Mrs. W. G. Shaner, Mrs. Joseph Dayspring, Ruth Burgess and Mrs. G. C. Wood. Alternates named were Mrs. R.

S. Ferrell, Mrs. Janie F. Ware, Mrs. D. W. Cheatham and Mrs. J. L. Jones.

Attending the Atlanta meetings will be Mrs. A. Clarke Bledsoe, Miss Burgess, Mrs. Ware, Mrs. D. W. Cheatham and alternates named were Mrs. Ferrell, Mrs. Wood, Mrs. Jones and Mrs. Evie F. Ewers.

September marks the birth month of the UDC, which was founded by Mrs. Caroline Meriweather Goodlett of Nashville, Tenn., and Mrs. L. H. Raines of Georgia. The organization was established Sept. 10, 1894, in Nashville.
