Delicious refreshments were served by the hostess. The home was decorated in flags & spring flowers. The business followed.

Mrs. McNamee, Ch. of benevolent conv. announced the death of Mr. Perrow since the last meeting. & the celebration of two birthdays of Messrs Harvey & Debell. Cor. Rec., Mrs. Evans, reported having written a letter to Mrs. Almond & read her reply in regard to her resignation.

Mrs. M^c Cue stated she would receive donations to Stratford.

The Rec. Sec. read the letter recd. by the Pres. from the Mary Taliaferro ^{Thompson} Memorial Association requesting a donation for the building of a fireproof museum upon the battlefield of Manassas.

After a discussion proposed by Mrs. R. P. Beasley, a motion was made by Mrs. Beasley that the ch. would make a contribution to Stratford + \$5 to the Memorial at Manassas. It was carried 18 for the motion, 6 opposed.

Later a motion for \$10 to Stratford, carried.

Mrs. Bowles, ch. of historic markers explained how a ^{Graded} marker can be obtained only a record of the soldier furnished, no cost to the recipient as the Gov. furnishes them except placing it on grave. Treasurer's report stated \$218.49 in bank.

The flags can be bought fr. a W. firm for \$12 gross + postage \$1.50 a dozen. Letter tabled.

Mrs. D. C. Jackson made a motion that the Chapter would endorse the name of George Washington for the new school building. Carried.

Mrs. Anderson announced the District meeting at Chase City on Apr. 27. Delegates appointed Mrs. DeWalt, Mrs. Haskins, Mrs. Jackson, Mrs. Caskle, Mrs. Beasley, Mrs. Davis.

Fred M^r: Wane placed a wreath on the Early Monument in St. Hill. Pictures of Stratford were sent to the chapter, from the Mrs Carter Lee chapter, of Bristol, asking that they be sold for \$1.00 each, our chapter to keep half, and send the other half to them - all of which will go to the Stratford Fund Report showed that our chapter has paid two-thirds of its quota, (Stratford Fund).

The Historian, Mrs. J. P. Paris, urged the Daughters to take part in the historical contests, subjects for essays being furnished by the Historian General, and the State Historian of the Va.
