Information is included on the James River Cement Works and the Locher family, manufacturers of cement used in building the James River & Kanawha Canal. Although the primary focus of the collection is the canals and waterways of Virginia, canal projects and source materials from other states are also included. The collection also includes maps of the right-of-way of the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad Company, along the James River and Kanawha Canal in Virginia.

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**VIRGINIA CANALS AND NAVIGATIONS SOCIETY**

The Virginia Canals and Navigations Society was formed in 1977 to preserve and enhance Virginia's rich inland waterways heritage in all its aspects, including history, exploration, archaeology, modeling, local lore and legend, restoration, preservation, park and trail development. The Society became organized in 1980 with a constitution, by-laws, and elected trustees. In 1982 it was chartered by Virginia as a non-stock corporation, and by the federal government as a nonprofit organization. T. Gibson Hobbs conducted research on all aspects of the canal system in Virginia, but concentrated primarily on the James River and Kanawha Canal, gathering research materials from numerous sources, both printed and original, dating from 1778. I. Hill Christian, III, collected notes from a variety of sources on canals in Virginia and in other states.
