This country, regardless of droughts and heavy demands for relief funds, is squandering millions, possibly billions of dollars, every year in provision and patronage of sports while more imperative needs exist and important interests suffer. We all like amusements, sports, diversions and trips, and many of us indulge these desires to the neglect of payment of debt and obligations to others. No one enjoys sports and amusements more than this writer, but we realize that there is a limit to our indulgence in the gratification of these desires.

The cost of base ball, football, golf, tennis, and all popular diversions have grown amazingly in a decade, but the public blithely pays these enormous bills, whether one can afford it or not. The prices of all sports exhibitions and of the preparation and equipment of players and participants mounts steadily until the masses of the people have no adequate idea of the vast sums thus squandered.

May we not systematically act to abate the vast waste annually in the name of sports? Great concrete stadiums are provided for use for only a few days each year, and philanthropists give liberally, not to say extravagantly to provide them. Great acreages are absorbed in these stadiums and fields every year. The cost of even amateur sport has grown so great in recent years that fewer can actually afford the price of patronage, and the majority actually cannot pay the cost of indulgence.

Isn't it time for the pendulum to swing back toward moderation in all such expenditures? It assuredly seems so to us.

MAKING HOME BETTER

Just as a man needs a new suit occasionally for the good of his soul, so does the improvement of the home grounds bring satisfaction to the owner. A story in point was told recently by H. C. Fetterolf about one of the F. F. A. boys in Northern Pennsylvania. It goes like this:

The boy's parents had little interest in their farm. The farm reflected their attitude. They just got along and looked forward to the day when they could sell the place.

Then the boy, still in high school, got interested in the farm—particularly in poultry. He persuaded the folks to paint the house and plant flowers and shrubs. Apparently that was the spark needed to start the fire, for the result was one of the best kept and most profitable farms in that part of the state. Would they sell now? No siree! It's too good a place to live.

USEFUL BY-PRODUCTS OF UNEMPLOYMENT

Whether or not unemployment in the United States actually is as bad as many would have it appear, there has developed, due to concerted local relief efforts in coordination with President Hoover's plan, an attitude of sympathy and mutual aid, not frequently found, even during times of greatest prosperity. This attitude has been strengthened with the reported growing need of relief, and today one finds those with steady work voting to reduce hours, so as to give employment to others, or voting to accept wage cuts, that the money may be used in employing others. Some are even giving up or "lending" their jobs to the needy.

The workers themselves, however, are not the only ones to meet the situation in such manner. Some employers have agreed not to lay off workers, in certain cases, too, where keeping them means a decided loss, and have agreed to take on new workers even where unnecessary. Some have gone so far as to discontinue the use of labor-saving machinery, so as to give man power employment.

To appreciate such actions from employers, at a time when low buying power has impaired profits, it should be realized that, while they may perhaps increase buying power to some extent by increasing employment, they are not likely to do so sufficiently to offset the immediate loss.

Again one finds liberal contributions to funds for relief of the idle, coming from employee and employer alike. And not only is money given in this movement, but valuable time, greatly needed to reinforce private means, is donated generously that programs for providing employment may be formulated.

All this certainly is striking evidence of the true, underlying character of the so-called "hard" business world. It indicates a measure of sympathy for the "under dog" and an understanding wish to do good and to be fair. It sometimes takes just such circumstances to bring this humane attitude to light.

It is to be hoped that all will profit from the lesson and that the brotherly atmosphere will continue into good times, when it is as much needed for maintenance of morale as for relief in times of depression.

ANOTHER AUTO FUEL

While the supply of gasoline may eventually run out there is no need for automobile drivers to worry over that possibility.

Alcohol motor fuel can be used just as successfully and there is little chance of this supply ever failing, because it can be made from crops which can be grown annually.

In Brazil the government is seeking to popularize the use of alcohol and requires all official cars to use this fuel, which consists of a mixture of cane alcohol and ether.

According to the Department of Commerce, gasoline sells in Brazil for around eighteen cents whereas the alcohol motor fuel does not exceed eight cents per gallon in cost. It is highly probable that motors in the next few years will be built to utilize this fuel rather than the present one.

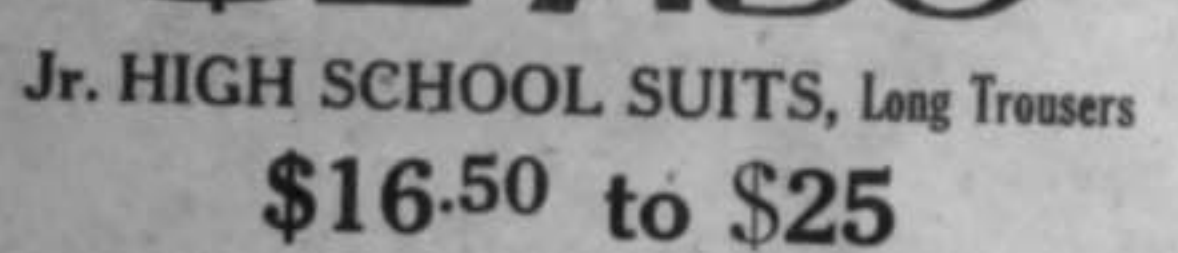
