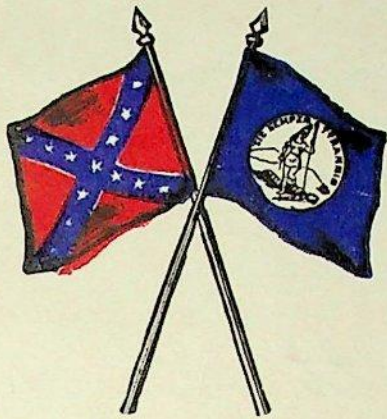

RECORD OF SERVICES

In 1861 Dr. ^{Wm.} H. Abbitt entered the service as Captain of Co. "B." 46th Va. Regiment. In August 1862 he was wounded and an attack of typhoid fever followed, and he was brought to his home in Appomattox county Va. He recovered sufficiently to return to the army, which he did in 1863. He was put on the physician's examining board, or in some similar service, where he served until the close of the war.

George H. Abbitt brother of the above entered the service at the same time and as 2nd Lieut. in the same company. When his brother Dr. Abbitt* was taken home with fever, he was made captain of

the company, where he served until the close of the war.

* Two captains were killed after Dr. Abbill was taken home, before Geo. W. Abbill was made captain. First Capt. Farrar, who was killed 2nd. Jennings Wise, son of Gov. Ferris a Wise, who was killed at Roanoke Island. Then Geo. W. Abbill was made captain.

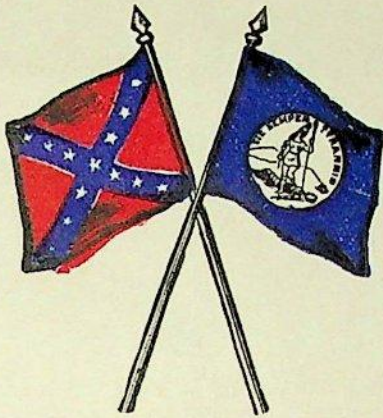

Geo. W. Abbitt a brother of the above, entered the service at the same time and as 2nd Lieut. in the same company. When his brother* Dr. Abbitt was taken home sick, *he was made Captain of the company.

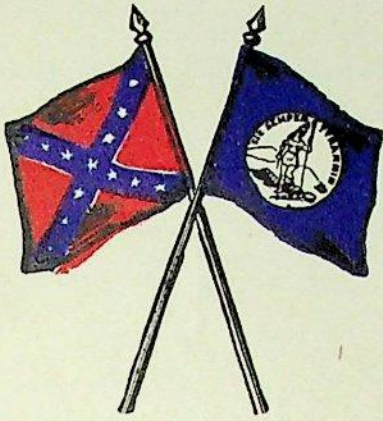

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RECORD OF SERVICES

My father, Thomas S. Bocock, having served 15 years in the U. S. Congress & still in that service at the breaking out of the war, returned to cast his lot with his own State. He was the only Speaker of the Confederate Congress.

My Grand-father, Charles Geo. Faulkner was Minister to France at the out-break of the Civil war. He returned to his country & on going to Washington to deliver up his cred. letters, at the State Department, was taken prisoner & held for 3 months. After that he was on Jackson's Staff. He is all the reports which are now in the War Department at Washington, D. C.

My Uncle, E. Boyd Faulkner, was taken prisoner the second year of the war, taken to Jamaica Island & not exchanged for nearly two years. When released he joined & fought until the surrender.

Another uncle, Charles J. Faulkner Jr.
entered the Army as a mere boy
going with the other V.M.I. Cadets.
He was in the thrilling battle of
New Market & later captured with
out assistance 14 Federal soldiers.
At the time of the surrender, he
walked with bleeding feet from
Richmond to the home of his
brother-in-law in Appomattox.

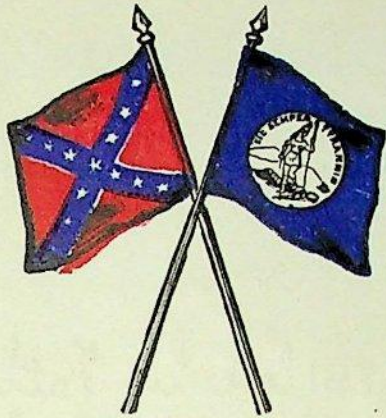

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RECORD OF SERVICES

Richard F. Burke 9 years old in Dec. 1861 lost his Father in 1856 was raised by his Grandfather W^m Blunt Erby he carried provisions for his Grandfather to the confed soldiers day after day & prayed that the children would be called into service that he might go. My Mother's Father also died in 1856. Walter M. Erby & Geo. N. Erby of Nottoway Co, Va volunteered in 1861 were privates in "Nottoway Cavalry" they engaged in "seven days fight around Richmond" Manassas "Gettysburg" & others surrendered at Appomattox C.H. Va April 9th 1865. In 63. Geo. Erby went home to be married after which he returned and fought to the end. His substitute for Farming was furnished horse saddle & bridle & paid \$100 in cash. Edward Erby their brother was Captain of the infantry Co of Shelby Co. Tenn. was wounded in the hip in the Battle of Shiloh but returned to his Co & fought to the end. Saul & John L. Burke volunteered in 61 were in the "Nottoway Rifle Guard". Saul who was first Lieut. received no injuries. John was wounded. Smith, Edward, & Labrey Lively of Campbell Co. members of Company C 11th Va Reg. Artillery Brigade Pickett's Div & Long Street Corp. engaged in battles "Wilderness" 1st & 2nd Manassas, "Williamsburg" seven days fight around Richmond "The Crater" & "Gettysburg" Smith & Edward were

wounded & imprisoned at Point Lookout. Habney was killed
at Gettysburg, Robt. Tweedy brother of above was private in an infantry Co his
Captain was killed he succeeded him & was killed the next day by a
Federal Sharp shooter at Sailor Creek near Petersburg. Grandmother Burke
sews, nursed the soldiers sewed, aid knitting, weaving and mended
for them. Mrs. Blunt Drby was a large planter of Nottoway Co Va was
too old for service as soldier but he & his wife Sarah Washington
furnished every assistance possible to the Confederacy sent
slaves to build the railroads furnished horses for the supply wagons
sent a large part of his crop to feed them, keeping his sons (who
were in the Cavalry) supplied with horses all during the war
while Great Grandpa mended spin weave & knit for the
soldiers Col. Saml. C. Burke of Nottoway Co. Va rendered
same service as that of Grandpa Drby he also gave
up his large house at Burkeville to Confed. soldiers
for hospital & took his family to what was called
his quarter place. Great Grandpa Tweedy & his
wife who raised my mother furnished provisions
for the soldiers lost two sons Robt & Habney
and gave assistance in a great
many ways

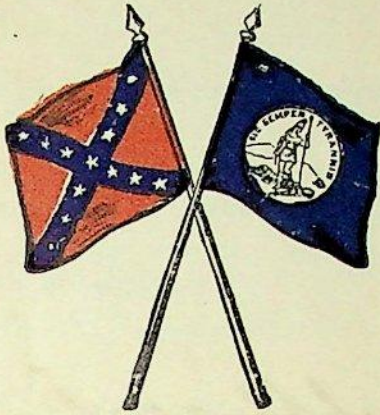
