On June 3rd 1909 Miss Peters, feeling unable to continue the copying, turned it over to Miss Early. Returned to Miss Peters, who again gave it (Aug. 1912) to Miss Early.

BESTOW HONOR CROSSES

Interesting Program Of Old Dominion Chapter, U. D. C.

The ceremony of bestowing crosses of honor upon veterans and descendants by the Old Dominion Chapter, U. D. C., took place at the home of Mrs. Peter Ainslie on the afternoon of September 16th. The Chapter's president, Miss Ruth H. Early, presided over the exercises, the program of which follows:

Address—Mr. Don P. Halsey.

Reading of rules regarding bestowal Presentation of crosses to General T. T. Mumford—Miss Ethel Jones and Mrs. W. E. Burnham.

Maj. A. F. Biegers, Mr. R. T. Lacey and Mr. W. J. Blacks were received by proxies.

Solo and chorus: "Medley of Southern Songs"—School children.

One of the most enjoyable features of the occasion was the beautiful and touching talk given by General Mumford, following the splendid address delivered by Mr. Halsey.

This is the last time that crosses of honor can be presented and brings to a close one of the most beautiful rites inaugurated by the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

DIES IN NEW ORLEANS

Bedford City, Feb. 20.—(Special.) A telegram was received this morning from New Orleans by Mrs. Ellen Davis Gregory, announcing the death of her brother, Major Thomas Edward Davis, which occurred at the home of his adopted daughter, Mrs. Paul Jay, two months ago his youngest son.

George W. Davis, died very suddenly in New Orleans, and Major Davis was so prostrated by the shock that he had been steadily falling ever since. Major Davis, who was about 82 years of age, was a native of this place, the eldest son of the late Judge and Mrs. Micajah Davis.

He was a graduate of the University of Virginia, and a man of exceptional ability and high attainments. Upon the beginning of the war of the Confederacy he enlisted as a private in a company of cavalry of Bedford, commanded by General William R. Terry, called the Clay Dragoons, but was soon promoted to the rank of adjutant of the Second Virginia Regiment of Cavalry. Later he became aid de camp to General John B. Floyd, with whom he remained to the close of hostilities, making a brilliant record for gallantry and devotion to duty.

After the war he went to Montana then a wild section with no connection with any point, and engaged in business for several years. Thence he went to Texas and became editor of a newspaper. From there he moved to New Orleans and in a short time became editor in chief of The Picayune, which position he held for about thirty-five years and was regarded as one of the ablest and most vigorous editors of that city. He was a scholar of rare scope and versatility and was a recognized power in political and literary life in New Orleans.

While living in Texas, Major Davis met Miss Mollie E. Moore, a distinguished authoress and poetess of that State, and they married and moved to New Orleans, where she became a center of the literary life of that city. She died several years ago, leaving him alone.

There is only one member of his family remaining, his sister, Mrs. E. D. Gregory, of Bedford City. Major Davis will be buried beside his wife and brother in Mellairs cemetery, New Orleans.

OLD DOMINION CHAPTER.

Liberal Donations Made to Confederate Monuments.

The Old Dominion Chapter, U. D. C., held a most delightful meeting at the home of Mrs. Mary Nowlin, on Pearl street, Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

There was no formal program arranged, as there was so much business of interest to the chapter to be disposed of.

An appeal was received from the Jubal Early Chapter, of Rocky Mount, for the Jubal Early monument fund, which appeal met with a most hearty response, fifty dollars being subscribed for the present, and more promised later.

A contribution of \$25 was also made to the Jackson Memorial Hospital at Lexington.

Several appeals for charity were heard and responded to favorably.

A communication was read from the family of the late General Joseph Wheeler, acknowledging the receipt of a letter of condolence from the chapter.

A letter was read from Hon. Tipton D. Jennings, making suitable acknowledgment for a resolution of the chapter endorsing his course in presenting a bill appropriating \$400 for the care of the returned Confederate flags.

A letter was also read from Congressman Carter Glass, in which he assured the chapter that he would do all in his power to promote the passage of the bill for the establishment of a military park at Petersburg.

The invitation of the Kirkwood Otey Chapter to attend the lecture to be given by Dr. Arnold at the Elks' Home April 3rd, was accepted.

The chapter was much interested in hearing of a memorial window to Stonewall Jackson that has recently been placed in the Fifth Avenue Memorial church (colored) in Roanoke, Va. The inscription read: "For memory of Stonewall Jackson. Let us cross over the river and rest in the shade of the trees." The pastor, Rev. L. L. Downing, through whose efforts the window was erected, was raised in Lexington, and as a boy had heard his parents, who were in General Jackson's Sunday school class, talk of what a great and good man he was, and of his deep interest in the colored race. The Old Dominion Chapter sent a letter of congratulation to the church that had thus sought to honor the memory of the great soldier.

Much enthusiasm was manifested over the receipt to be given Saturday afternoon, at the Assembly Hall, by Miss Barbee and Mrs. A. Lynch Ward. Miss Barbee will arrive in the city Friday afternoon, and will be the guest of Miss Ruth Early.

Several new members were received in the chapter, which latter will elect officers next month.

The regular monthly meeting of the Old Dominion Chapter, U. D. C., was held at the residence of Mrs. Ernest Bowman Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

Mrs. W. M. Stokes, the newly elected president, was in the chair. The most important business before the chapter was the request to organize a new chapter at Buckingham Courthouse. The request came from Mrs. Eva Barnes Fitzgerald, asking that the chapter send the necessary information and papers for the formation of a chapter. This was promptly done.

A gratifying letter was read from Miss H. J. Wood, who now occupies the room furnished by the Old Dominion Chapter in Richmond at the Home for Needy Confederate Women.

Letters were read from Rev. Downing, a preacher in Roanoke, enclosing a photograph of the memorial window, which his congregation had placed in their church in memory of Stonewall Jackson.

A communication from Mrs. Mulcare, custodian of the District of Columbia, was also read, asking that the chapter assist in selling post-cards and engravings of Stratford, the birthplace of Lee, for the benefit of Arlington cemetery, Va.

An application from Mrs. James Mercer Garnett, chairman of the History Committee, Virginia Division, asking the chapter to forward her their plans for historical work for the year, was received, and a motion was carried to leave such work to Major R. M. T. Hunter, the study of which will be diligently prosecuted next winter by the chapter. An appeal from the William R. Terry Chapter, Bedford, for aid in erecting a monument there, was read, and while no contribution could be sent now, as the chapter this year had already contributed to Stonewall Jackson Memorial Hospital at Lexington \$25, Fitz Lee, Richmond, \$10, Appomattox, \$10, Jubal Early Chapter, Rocky Mount, \$50. They yet hope very soon to send the William R. Terry chapter a contribution.

The charity work, it was decided, should be continued through the summer months.

Several new members were added to the roster. The following committee was appointed to arrange as usual for the observance of Memorial and Battle Day, June 19th: Miss Annie Lind Forsberg, chairman; Miss Mollie Early, Mrs. E. C. Glass, and Mrs. J. Davis Christian.

On motion of Miss Maria E. Walker a prize of a \$5 gold piece was offered the boy or girl in the second grammar grade of the Lynchburg public school writing the best essay during the session of 1906-07 on "The Causes Leading up to the War with the States."

On invitation Mrs. William M. Strother was asked to give instructions in parliamentary law to the chapter at any two meetings, which might best suit her convenience. After enjoying a delicious ice, served by the hostess, the chapter resumed business and decided to deliver crosses of honor to Veterans and Sons the first Thursday in October, and at the same time to entertain Garland-Rodes Camp, C. V., and Sons at a dinner at City Park.

The meeting, which was of unusual interest, adjourned until next September.

The "Old Dominion" Chapter United Daughters of the Confederacy
was formed June 23d 1896 at the Y. M. C. A. rooms (old building now replaced). Mrs Thomas S. Proston, Mrs Robert Strother,
Mrs Wm H. Jones, Mrs Davis Christian, Misses Maria Walker, Eliza Jones and Ruth H. Early (then Sec'y of Va. Division) being present.
The officers there elected were, president, Mrs Charles E. Heald; 1st vice-pres. Miss Maria C. Walker; 2d vice-pres. Miss Ruth
H. Early; Secretary, Mrs Davis Christian; Treas. Mrs Wm H. Jones. Time of monthly meetings 2d Monday. At the 2d meeting the
name "Old Dominion" was chosen from a number proposed. The constitution and by laws were printed and circulated on Sept. 14th.
At the October meeting 65 members were reported and others were added then. This was then the 13th chapter in the Va. Division
and chartered 69 in the general U. D. C. organization. Mrs Wilkes Clark was state president and was elected a delegate to the
state convention. Miss Ruth H. Early was also a delegate there and with 13 votes out of 25 carried the election creating Miss Amelia
Smith president. Mrs Clark was also delegate to the U. D. C. convention meeting in Nashville, where she was elected Treasurer
of the general organization. The delegate was instructed to vote for the re-election of Mrs Raines, to ask that the 15c tax be divided
between state and general body; that a charge be made for application blanks; that a form of transfer from one chapter to another be given.
At the October 12th meeting the historian Miss L. Cowland was elected.

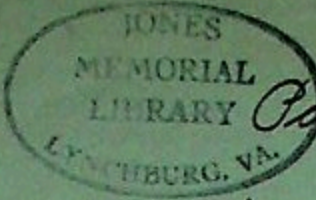
Erected at the Grave of Col. John
Bowie Strange in Maplewood
Cemetery.

Charlottesville, Va., Dec. 14.—(Special.)—Simple but impressive exercises were held in the courthouse at 2:30 o'clock yesterday in connection with the unveiling of the monument erected at the grave of Col. John Bowie Strange Camp, Confederate wood cemetery. Capt. H. Clay Michie, past commander of John Bowie Strange Camp, Confederate Veterans, presided, and the address was by Judge R. T. W. Duke, Jr., who gave a brief summary of the life of the gallant commander of the Nineteenth Virginia Regiment, who was killed September 14, 1862, at Boonsboro, Md. The account of Strange's death was brought to the attention of his kinspeople in a strange way long after his death. Judge Duke stated. A package of bloodstained papers was sent to one of his relatives by a Federal officer, who stated that he took them from the body of a Confederate colonel who was killed at Boonsboro. Strange had been wounded and was lying upon the ground. Though the surging ranks of the enemy were approaching, the idea of surrender never entered his mind. He drew his revolver and raising himself began to fire into the lines of the enemy as they approached him. The enemy bayoneted him where he lay and the package of papers bore his life blood. The monument in Maplewood cemetery is of simple native granite, and consists of a base eight feet in length and a column placed thereon, on which is the following inscription: John Bowie Strange, Colonel Nineteenth Virginia Regiment. Born in the year 1823. Killed September 14, 1862, at Boonsboro, Md."
