Sir: I have today sent the following to Richmond-Times-Dispatch:

To Editor of Times Dispatch: Sir: - Permit me to congratulate you for reprinting in today's issue under "Views of the State Press" what the Lynchburg News had to say about Mrs Lawton and her expression in regard to Abraham Lincoln, for the editor of the News knows what he is talking about. There is no ambiguity about the matter. We have a record of Lincoln's reason for urging the passage of the 13th amendment, and there is no reason for assuming he had a different reason for issuing the emancipation proclamation. "I don't know" said Lincoln. "It makes no difference, though what they want (Referring to Congressmen who were holding up the admission of Nevada as a state, their vote necessary to carry the constitutional amendment) Here is the alternative; that we carry this vote or be compelled to raise another million & more men, and fight no one knows how long: It is a question of 3 votes or new armies (C. A. Dana "Recollections of the War") I quote what Lincoln said, & Dana makes some explanation for freeing the slaves, that the Ed. of News gave.

There is a bronze memorial in Lee Mem. Chapel of Wm & Lee Univ. to a northerner who came to Lexington & eulogized R. E. Lee. There is a statue in Alabama to Booth, the man who assassinated Lincoln. As a northerner, I have yet to hear condemnation of the heroes of the South. It is simply ignorance that wd lead any one to attack a dead man who is considered a hero by a ^{goodly} great number of the people of this country and of the world. It is certainly a discourtesy not to be expected from a lady. F. C.

Unveiling of Mem. Arch at Fort Early.

July 15, 1924.

It is with satisfaction that we come to unveil a memorial, the completion of which means the consummation of 20 years thought and plan. And though it appears but a tardy tribute to an event which occurred 60 years ago, it is nevertheless one which can still excite interest in the city's annals.

Virginia has served often as a battlefield, yet war has never had the opportunity to imprint its traces here other than the chain of earthworks erected for its defence at a time when news of an invading and ruthless army spread terror throughout the community. To give an idea of the feeling which colored thought at the time, I recall an incident that occurred at my home: the grounds surrounding it were used as Headquarters for commissary wagons and a few prisoners were brought there. While my father (who served as an aide-de-camp) took the place of the guard who had gone to his dinner, a curious group of children gathered near & one of these, a lot of 2 years of age, asked him what soldiers those were; when she was told that they were Yankee prisoners, she quickly replied "you cant fool me, them's folks."

Had Breckenridge remained in the valley of Va. to block the

enemy from further advance had his horse not been killed and he injured by its fall, had Early, as ordered, had time to join Breckenridge & thus strengthen his force, perhaps Hunter could not have pursued his devious and disastrous march so near to Lynchburg. On the other hand, had not McCausland, with Imboden as matchman, been able to delay the enemy long enough, Early's stronger command would not have had chance to give the necessary succor, before it was too late. Concerning the actual events there remains more or less extant history of the fateful occurrences. The day of anxiety passed and the city returned to conditions which had been interrupted by the war episode: and Federal forces never got inside of the city on their mission of destruction of military stores collected here.

This gateway stands as an arch of triumph, because victory was here obtained over a numerically superior force, and because the works enclosed have since withstood the levelling processes of time, property interests and progress. Old Dominion Chapter dedicates the arch to the soldiers who came to the city's rescue, who erected here their defensive cannon, to those in command and those who carried to execution, orders which conduced to their success, still more to those who yielded up their lives in the service, happily these last were few. So we honor no unknown soldier, but those who bore the significant title of Confederate, a name which will arouse enthu-

I was in Gen. Robert E. Lee's army at Appomattox. Having served the Confederate States four years and thirty days, as long as any one could have served.

I am now in my 37th year as clerk of United States courts at Nashville, Tennessee. I once met General Early with Genls Beauregard and Bragg at my sister-in-law's, Mrs Beniss in New Orleans."

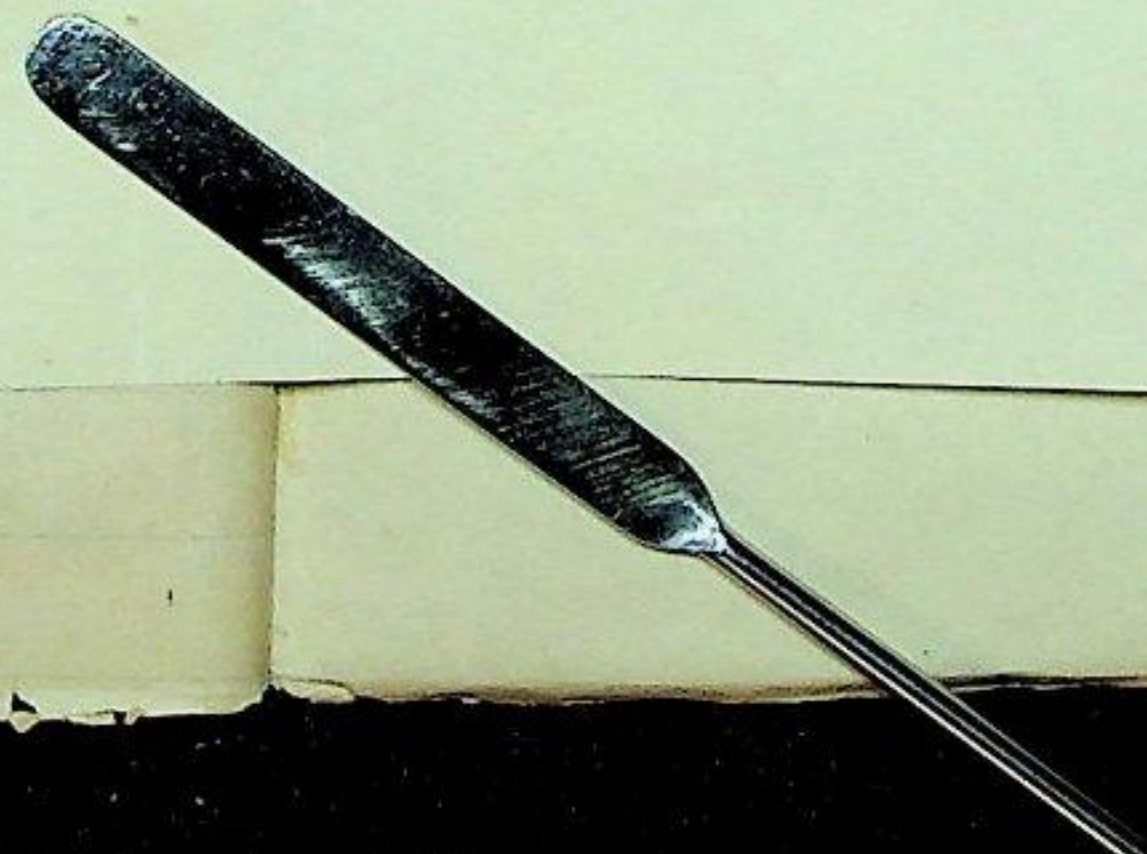
