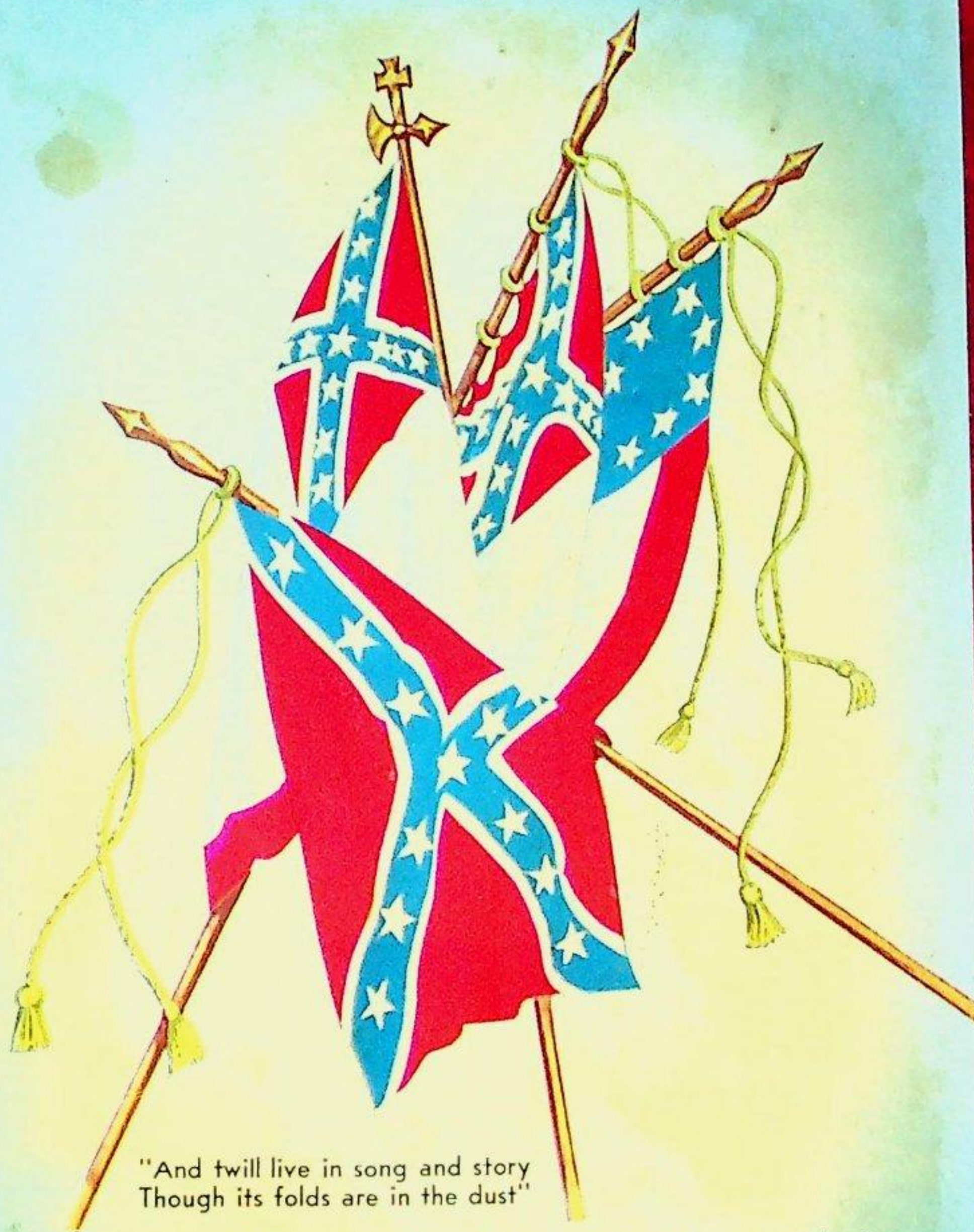

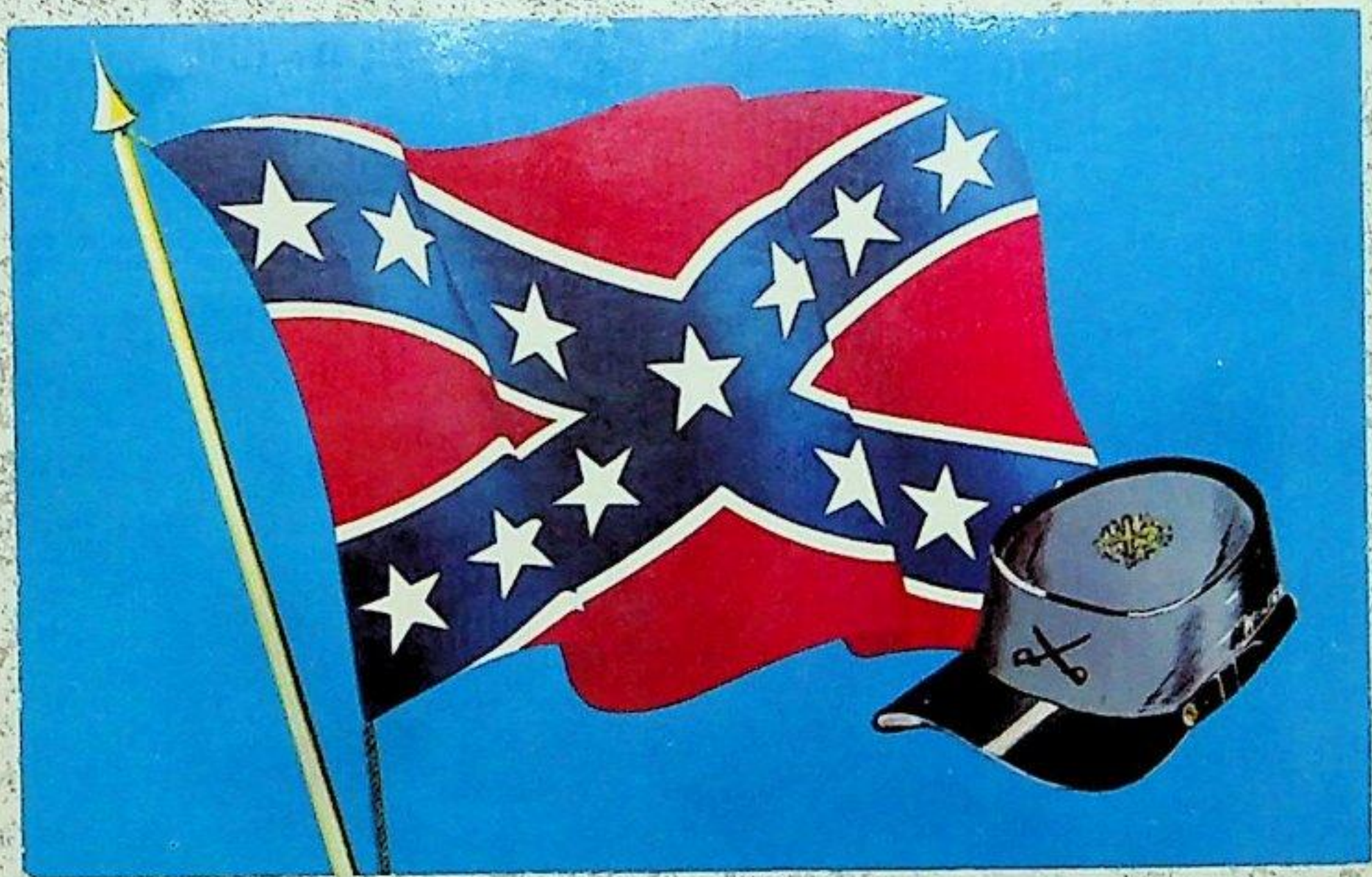
No. 1 The "Battle Flag" was designed by Gen. Beauregard, adopted by Gen. Joseph E. Johnston after the first battle of Manassas, and afterward adopted by the Confederate Congress. The reason for its adoption was, that in battle the "Stars and Bars" was frequently mistaken for the "Stars and Stripes." It remained as the "Battle Flag" until the close of the war.

No. 2 On March 4, 1865, the Confederate Congress adopted this design as the "National Flag" of the Confederate States, because the other, when limp, was too much like a flag of truce.

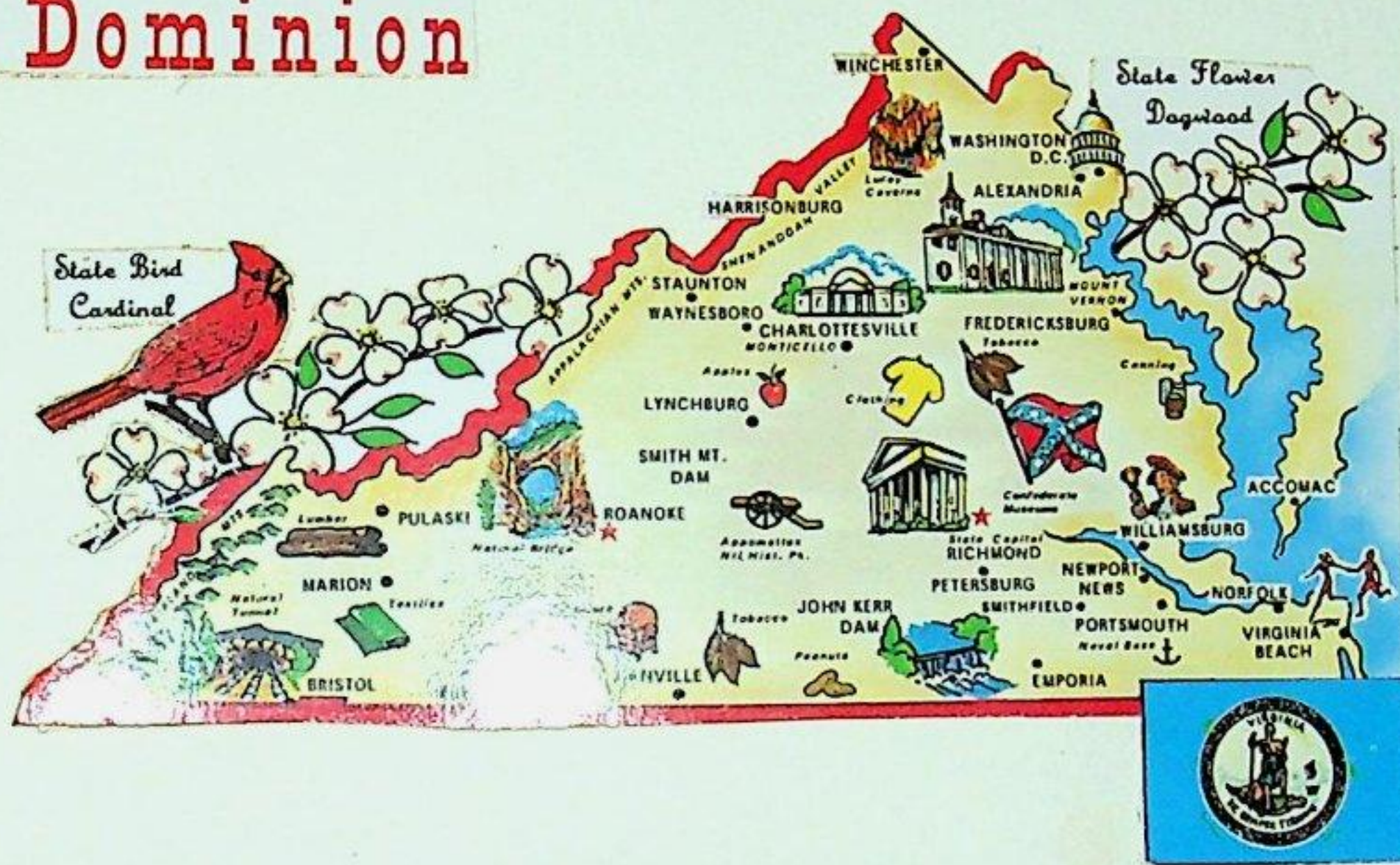
No. 3 On May 1, 1863, the Confederate Congress adopted this flag as the "National Flag."

No. 4 The "Stars and Bars" was the first flag of the Confederate States and was adopted by the Confederate Congress at Montgomery, Alabama.

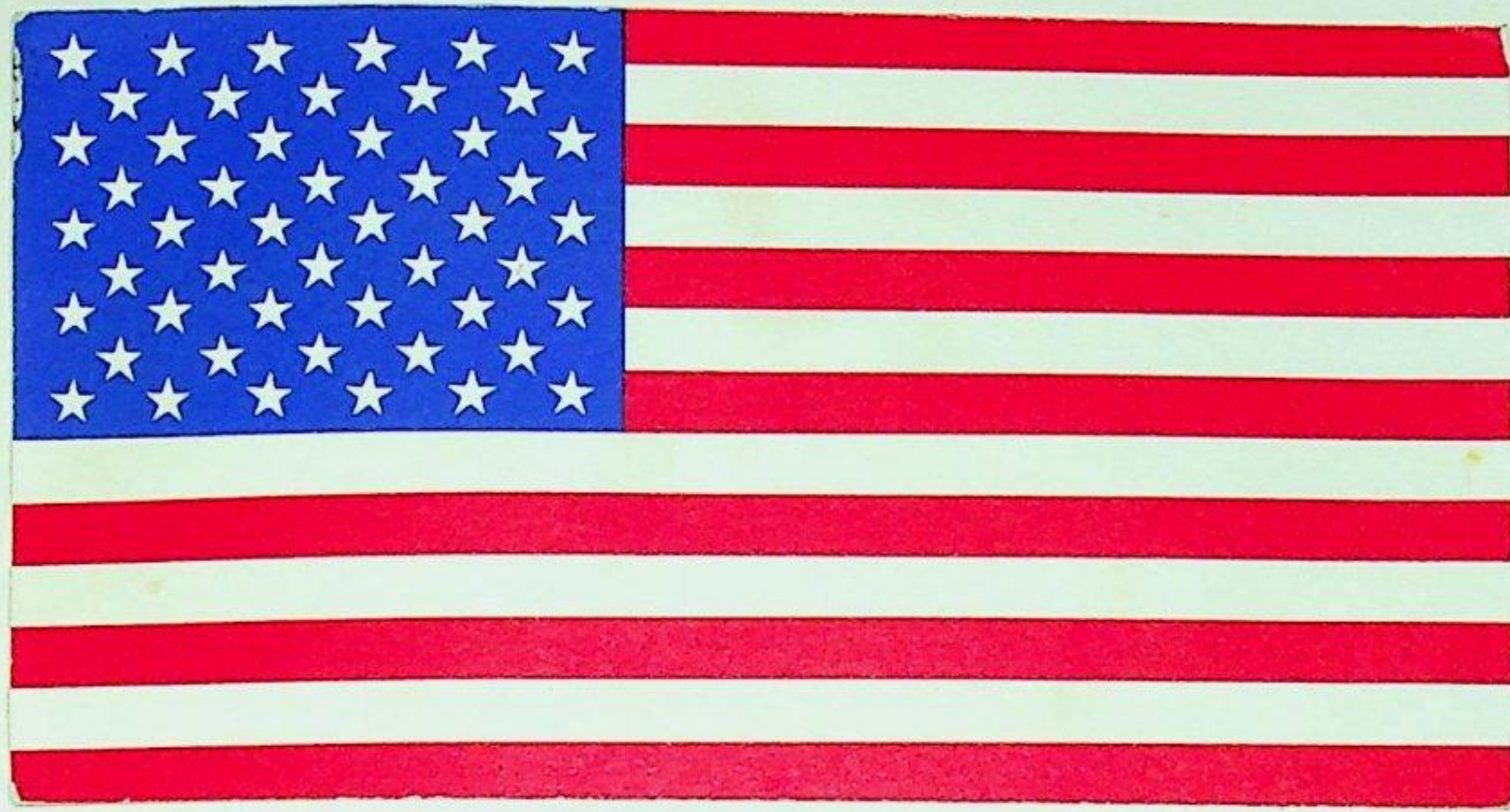

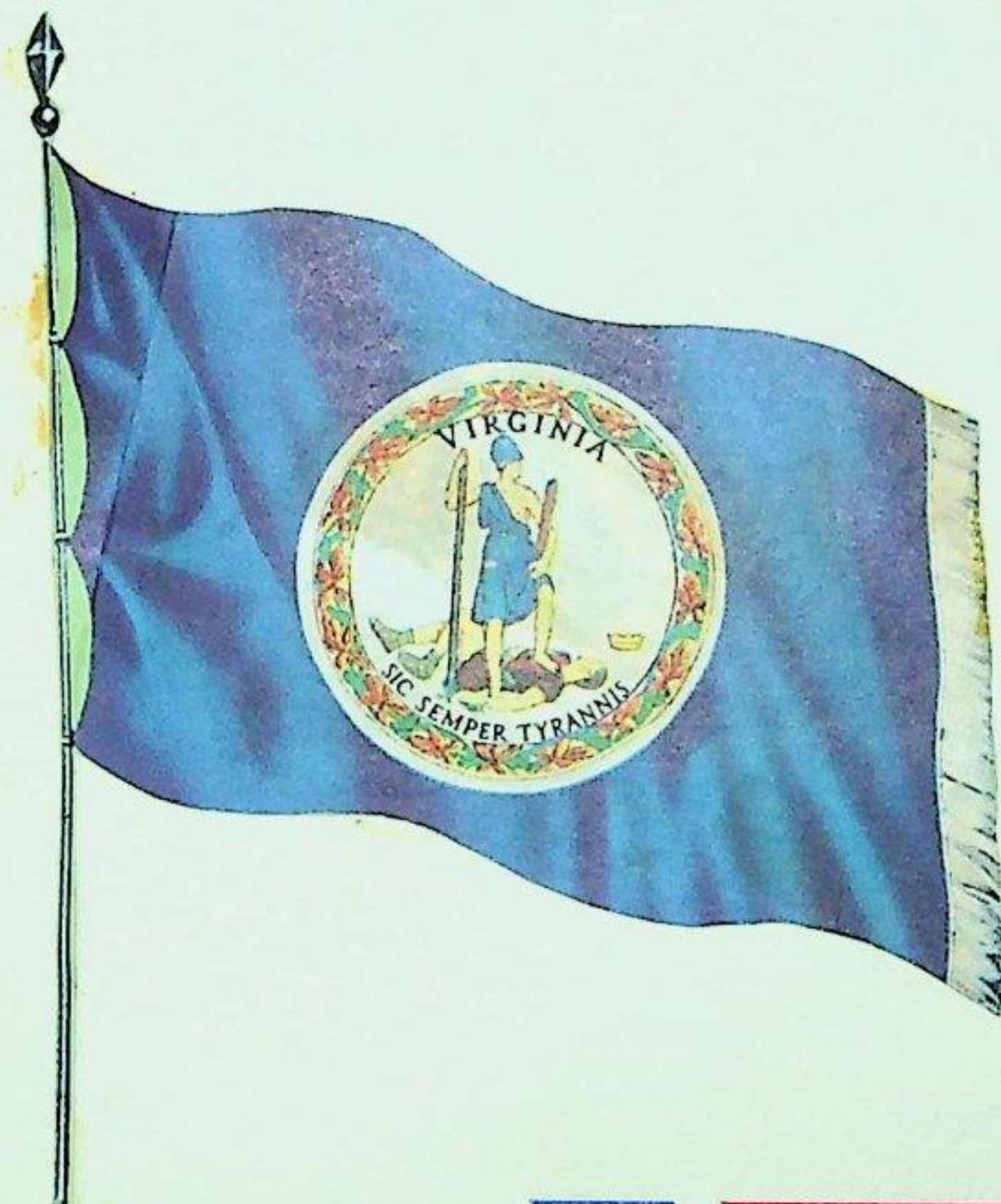

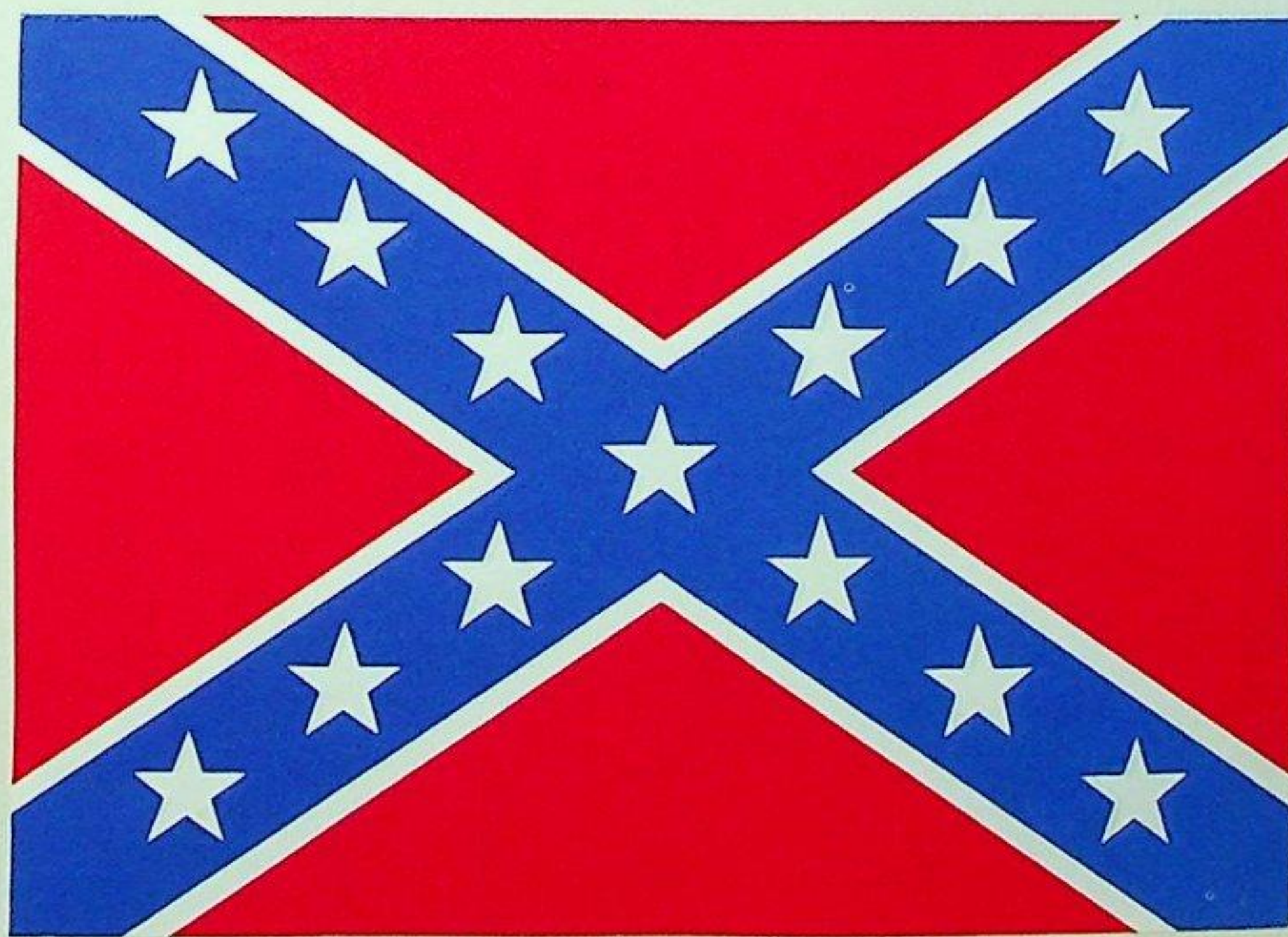
#### PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO U. S. FLAG

(Standing, face the flag, place ungloved right hand over the heart and hold in position until pledge is completed.)  
"I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."  
Drop arm completely after pledge.



#### SALUTE TO VIRGINIA FLAG

"I salute the flag of Virginia, with reverence and patriotic devotion to the 'Mother of States and Statesmen' which it represents—the 'Old Dominion', where liberty and independence were born."  
Drop arm completely after pledge.  
Written by Mrs. T. E. Gravely, Mildred Lee Chapter, Martinsville, Virginia. Voted unanimously by the Virginia General Assembly and officially adopted March 15, 1954.

(Standing, face the flag, place right hand over heart, and hold in position while repeating the words of the salute.)  
"I salute the Confederate Flag with affection, reverence, and undying remembrance."

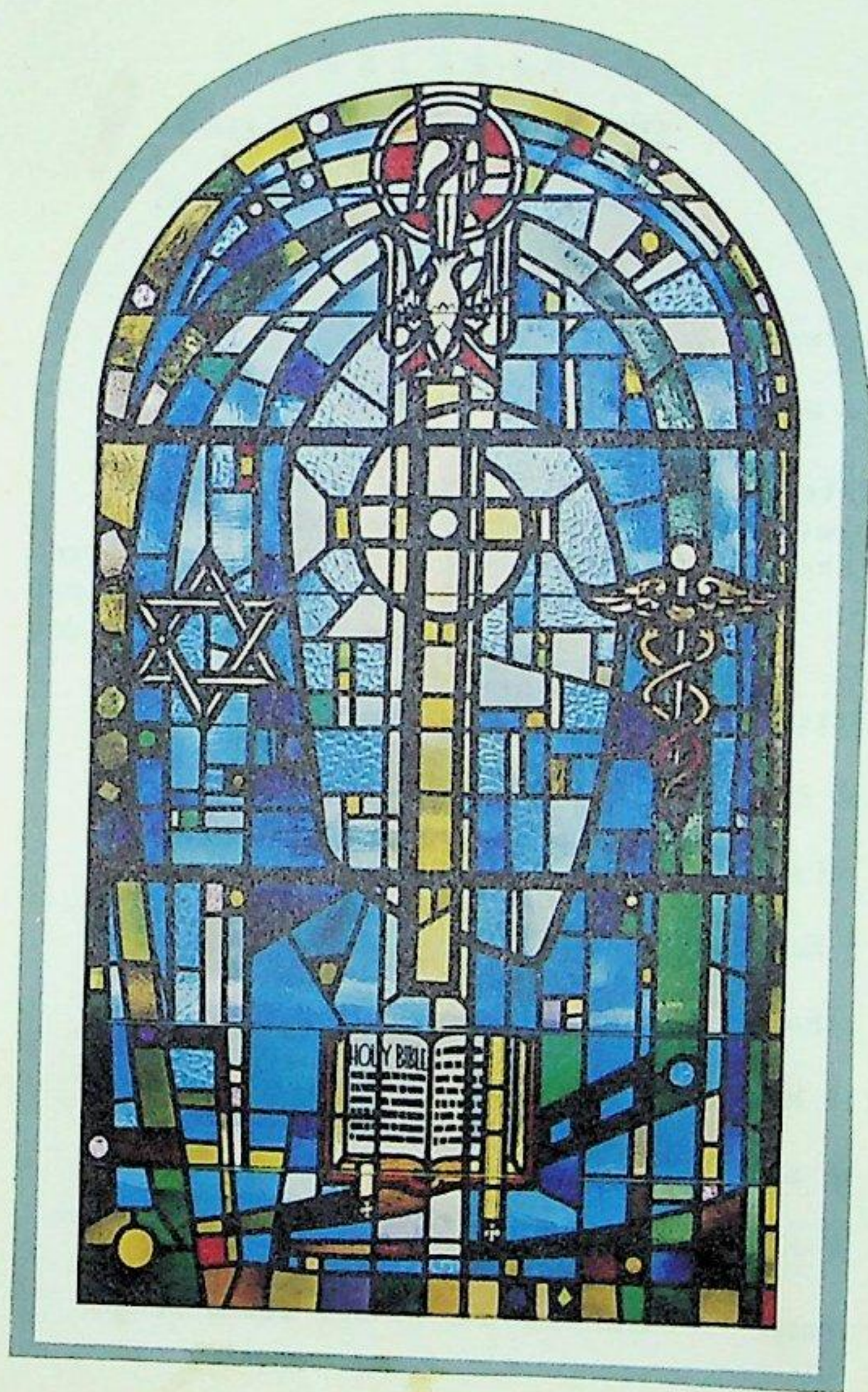

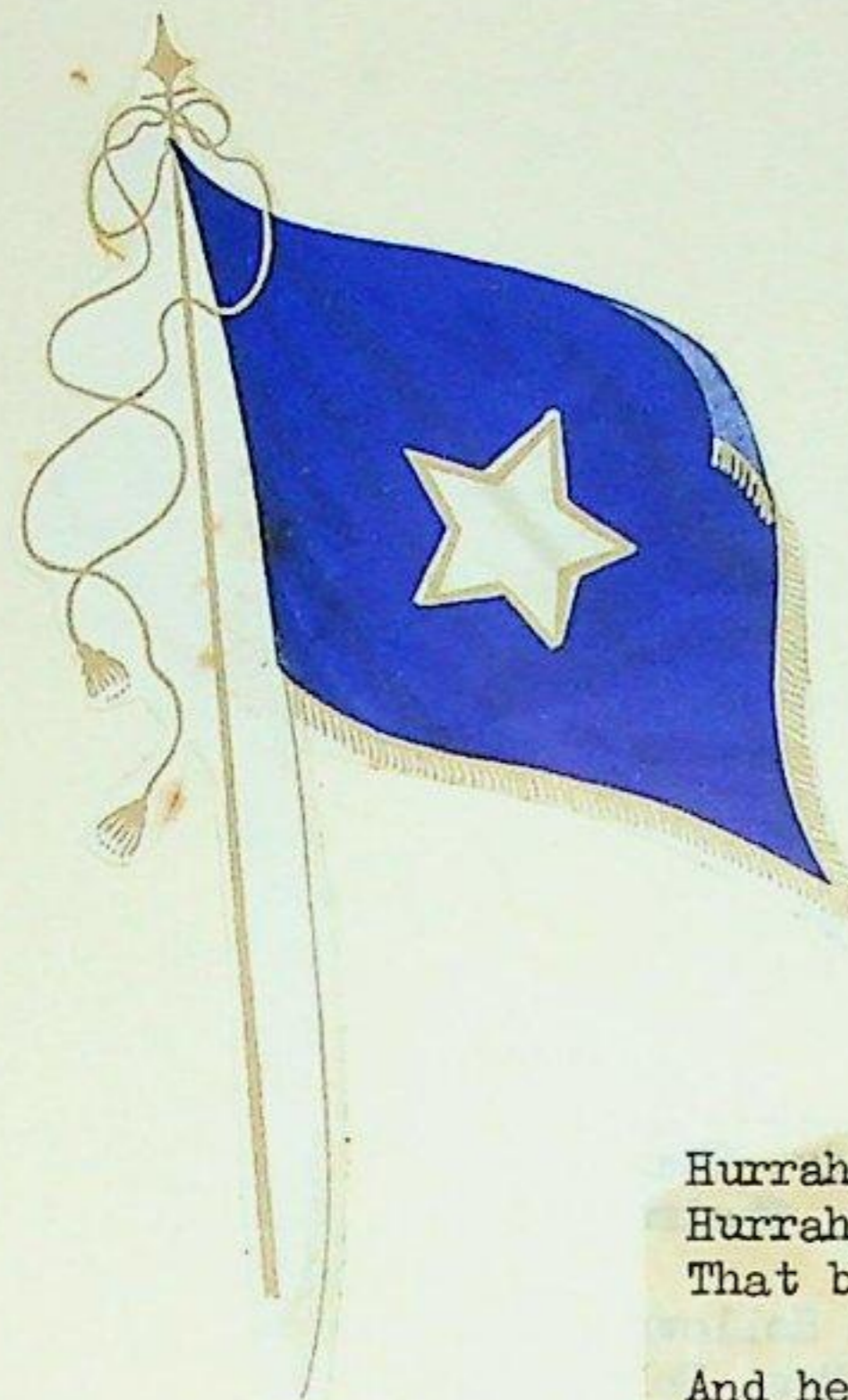

**UDC unit elects delegates**

Election of delegates to Virginia Division and the General Convention of the United Daughters of the Confederacy and a talk on "The War Between the States," comprised the program at the first fall meeting

of the Old Dominion Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy Tuesday at the home of Mrs. G. C. Wood of Homewood, Rustburg.

Delegates named to the Virginia Division convention in Fredericksburg Oct. 6-8, are: Ruth B. Burgess, president; Mrs. J. F. Ware, Mrs. D. W. Cheatham, Mrs. E. F. Baldwin and alternates are: Mrs. James L. Jones, Mrs. R. S. Ferrell, Mrs. Joseph Dayspring and Mrs. E. F. Ewers.

Delegates to the General Convention to be held in Richmond Nov. 7-13 are: Katharine Gilbert, Mrs. Dayspring, Mrs. Ferrell, Mrs. Baldwin and alternates are Miss Burgess, Mrs. James L. Jones, Mrs. Wood and Mrs. Ewers.

Speaking on "The War Between the States," Katharine Gilbert said, "The fact that for four years the Confederacy maintained an entirely separate government, with its own currency, commerce, army and navy, established the Confederate States of America as a separate nation, let us say The War Between the States instead of the Civil War...The Confederate Flag, the Stars and Bars, was reorganized all over the world as belonging to a nation other than the United States and the Confederate States — two separate nations — so the most exact name for that great conflict of the 1860's is the War Between the States."

Miss Gilbert said that al-

though it was Gen. Robert E. Lee's opinion that the Confederates should remain at home and rebuild a new south of the wreckage of war and the "persecution of the reconstruction, 2,300 Confederates were scattered over Mexico in 1866. Many went to offer their services to Maximilian, thus the Confederate "Carlota Colony" named for the beautiful empress, was established. One group to March into Mexico and offer services to the Emperor Maximilian was led by Gen. Joseph Shelby with 500 Officers and men."

Miss Gilbert told of the circumstances concerning General Shelby's trek into Mexico and the lowering of the Confederate Flag into the Rio Grande, "the last flag to fly over an organized Confederate force, the last flag which waved on Confederate soil, the flag which was never surrendered."

The speaker said although General Shelby later returned to his home in Missouri, many of his men followed him, however, many remained to seek their fortunes in Mexico.

In 1968 Mrs. Alfred Vernon Hall, then president general of the UDC, went to Mexico City and there established the General Joseph Orville Shelby Chapter of the UDC among the descendants of those former Confederate soldiers.

Mrs. Wood was assisted in her duties by members of the Matthew Fontaine Maury Circle of which she is chairman.

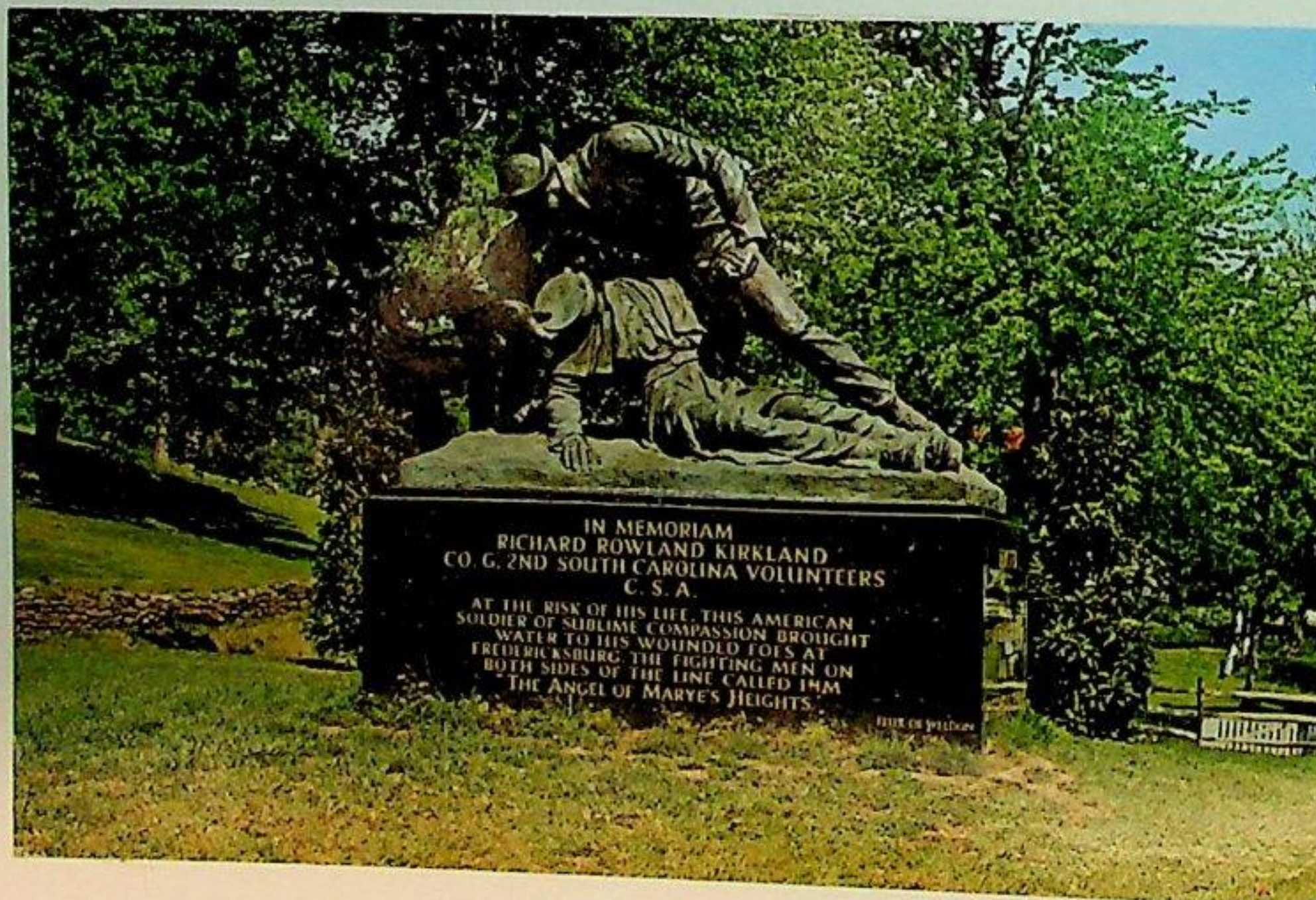

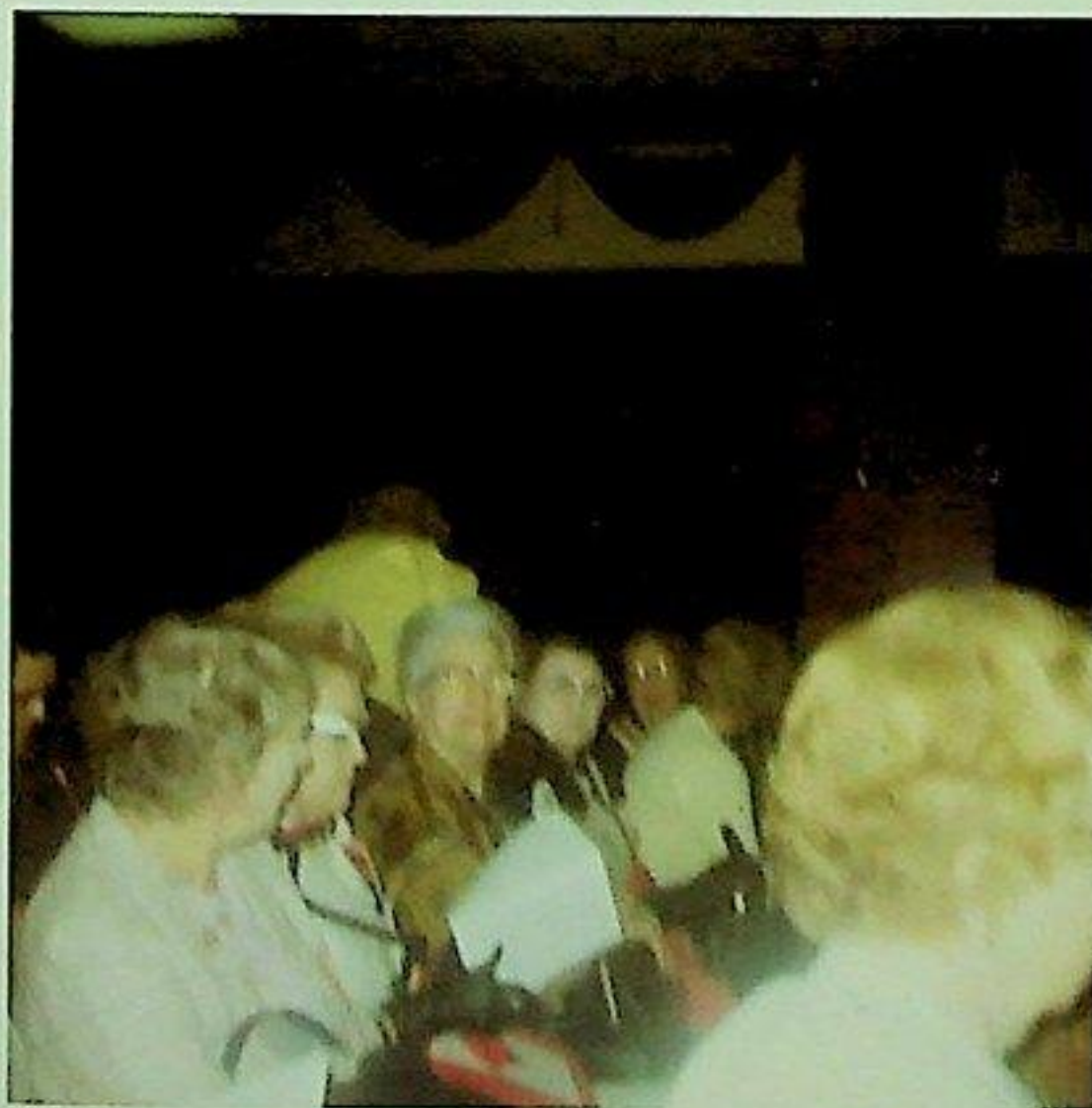
