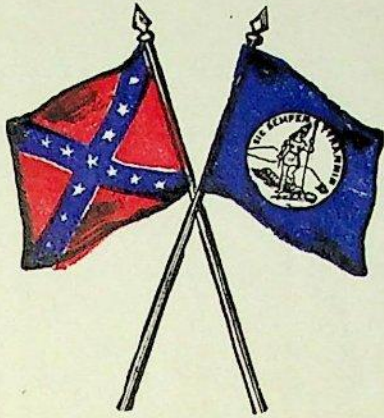

While at home he was detailed to help capture a deserter in hiding in the cliffs on Seneca Creek. He was shot by a Mr Rice from Pittsburgh, Pa. He was wounded in the thigh could not walk for three years and was a sufferer from the wound the rest of his life.

③ William Daniel Price belonged to the Dearing ^{#114} ^{David} Camp of Confederate Veterans of Campbell Co, Va.

④ Sydney Marion Price, my father's younger brother joined the navy in 1863 at the age of 16.

My great uncles:- Brothers of my grandfather Daniel M Price

① David Crocket Price was drafted in 1863 and was killed in Battle of Spotsylvania. C.H.

② Parham Felix Price drafted in 1863 - and was wounded in Battle of Chancellorsville

③ William Morris Price drafted in 1863, and was captured and put in prison in Delaware. He was paroled in 1865 but was so starved he could not travel and died before he could start home on April 11 - 1865.

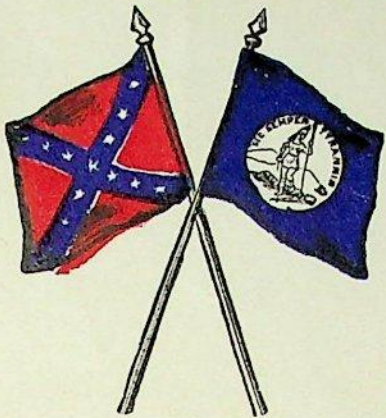

Richard F. Burke 9 years old in Dec. 1861 lost his Father in 1856 was raised by his grandfather Wm. Bluntley he carried provisions for his grandfather to the camp. Soldiers day after day & prayed that the children would be called into service that he might go. My Mother's Father also died in 1856 Walter M. Wiley & Geo. W. Wiley of Nottoway Co, Va. volunteered in 1861 in the private in "Nottoway Cavalry" they engaged in Sunday's fight around Richmond "Manassas", "Gettysburg" & others, surrendered at Appomattox C.H. Va. April 9th 1865. In 63. Geo. Wiley went home the man after which he returned and fought to the end. His substitute Geo. Jamming was furnished horse saddle & bridled and paid \$800 or in cash, Edward Wiley their mother was Captain in of the infantry Co. of Shelby Co. Tenn. was wounded in the hip in the Battle of Shiloh but returned to his Co. and fought to the end, Samuel & John Burke volunteered in 61 more in the "Nottoway Rifle Guard", Samuel who was first Lieut. carried no injuries John was wounded, Smith, Edward, & Delaney & meedy of Campbell Co. Members of Company C 11th Va Reg. "Kemp's Brigade" Pickett's Div. & Longstreet's Corp engaged engaged in battles "Wilderness", 1st & 2nd Manassas, "Williamsburg" - Sunday's fight around Richmond. "The Crater", & "Gettysburg". Smith & Edward were wounded

and imprisoned at Point Lookout, Salney was
killed at Gettysburg, Capt J. M. D. Smith of
was killed, he succeeded him but was killed the next
day by a Federal sharpshooter, at Sailor Creek near
Peterburg Va. Grandma Burke & Sears, nursed
the soldiers sick, did knitting, mending and
worked for them. Wm. Blunt of Va. was a large
planter of Nottoway Co. Va. was too old for service as soldier
but he & his wife furnished every assistance to the
Confederacy, sent slaves to build breast works
furnished horses for the supply wagons, sent
a large part of his crop to feed them, helping his
sons (who were in Cavalry) supplied with
horses all during the war, while his wife cared for
many sick soldiers at her home and spent much
of her time knitting & sewing for them. Col. Saml.
D. Burke of Nottoway Co. Va. was also too old for service
as soldier but rendered some services. Grandfather
Lily, & he also gave up his large house at Burksville
to Confed. Soldiers for a hospital & took his family
to what was called his quarters place. Great grandpa
J. M. D. Smith & wife (who raised my mother) furnished
provisions & clothes for the soldiers and lost
two of their sons, Ralt, and Salney.
