Geo. W. Abbott entered the war 1861, as second Lieut, in Company B. 46 - ~~company B. Va.~~ regiment. He succeeded his brother, Dr. W. H. Abbott as Capt in 1862.

In W. H. Abbott in 1861 entered the service as Capt. of company B 46, Va. regiment. In Aug. 1862 he was wounded and then had an attack of typhoid fever. He was brought to his home in Appomattox County Va.

In '63 he returned to the army and was put on physicians examining board where he served until close of the war.

Two Capt's were killed after Dr. Abbott was taken home, and before Geo. W. Abbott was made Capt. First Capt. Hannah was killed, second Capt. Jennings Wise, son of Gov. H. Wise who was killed at Ramoth Island, then Geo. W. Abbott was made Capt.

RECORD OF SERVICES

In the fall of 1863, Judeon Cary Davidson, of Appomattox County, Virginia being then seventeen years of age, enlisted at Goldsboro, North Carolina in Company "A" of the Eleventh Virginia Infantry, Pickett's Division, Longstreet's Corps, Army of Northern Virginia. He took part in battles around Kinston and Goldsboro, the Capture of Plymouth, North Carolina, the fighting after the evacuation of Newbern, and the actions of Cold Harbor, Duck Soap and Bermuda Hundred. From that time until the fall of Richmond he was in the trenches in front of Petersburg. Here although ill at the time he took his place in that line of battle which was almost constantly in action during the attack on the Petersburg lines. One occasion night frontal attacks were repulsed in one day. Wounded at the battle of Five Forks, he lay helpless on the battle-field for two days before being taken prisoner. During all this time the wounded Confederates were exposed to the suffering of unattended wounds and also to the violence of marauders who robbed them of any thing of value found on their persons. Private Davidson, unable to move, was about

to be ridden over by a regiment of Federal Cavalry, at the
command of an officer who did not observe the rules of
civilized warfare, but was saved by the humanity of an
unknown Northern soldier, who removed him from the
path of the approaching horsemen. Carried at last to a
field hospital ⁱⁿ a church in Dinwiddie County,
Private Davidson was carried at last to Petersburg thence
to Point of Rocks and finally to Hampton Roads. In all of these
hospitals and prisons the Confederate soldiers were the victims
of neglect, abuse, unskilled medical attendance and
cruelty of all kinds. The barbarous and shameful
treatment to which they were subjected was only brought
to an end by the proclamation of President Johnson of
the United States and their discharge on the fourth of
July 1865. Without money, adequate clothing or food they
were cast out of the hospitals, although many of them
were yet suffering from unhealed wounds whose
virulence was augmented by Federal disregard of
civilization. In this way they were left to make
their way home as best they could. After suffering of all
these hardships Private Davidson finally reached
his home, and under the skillful treatment of Dr.
G. W. Thornhill, surgeon in the Confederate Army
his serious wound healed, and he was restored
to health.

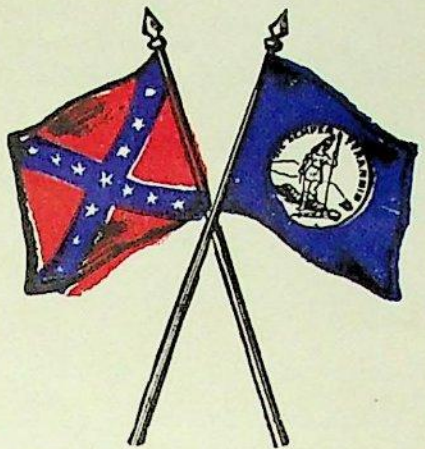

RECORD OF SERVICES

In the fall of 1863, Judson Carey Davidson, of Appomattox County, Virginia, being then seventeen years of age, enlisted at Goldsboro, North Carolina in Company "A" of the Eleventh Virginia Infantry, Pickett's Division Long-street's Corps Army of Northern Virginia.

He took part in the battles around Kinston and Goldsboro; the capture of Plymouth, North Carolina; the fighting after the evacuation of Newburn, and the actions of Cold Harbor, Dutch Gap and Bermuda Hundred.

From that time until the fall of Richmond he was in the trenches in front of Petersburg. Here, although ill at the time he took his place in that line of battle which was almost constantly in action during the attacks on the Petersburg lines. On one occasion nine frontal attacks were repulsed in one day.

Wounded at the battle of Five Forks, he lay helpless on the battlefield for two days before being taken prisoner. During all this time the wounded Confederates were exposed to the suffering of

unintended wounds and also to the violence of marauders who robbed them of anything of value found on their persons. Private Davidson, unable to move, was about to be ridden over by a regiment of Federal cavalry, at the command of an officer who did not observe the rules of civilized warfare, but was saved by the humanity of an unknown Northern soldier, who removed him from the path of the horseman. Carried at last to a field hospital set up in a church in Dinwiddie County, Private Davidson was carried to Petersburg thence to Point of Rocks, and finally to Hampton Roads. In all of these hospitals and prisons the Confederates were the victims of neglect, abuse, unskilled medical attendance and cruelties of all kinds. The shameful treatment to which they were subjected was only brought to an end by the proclamation of President Johnson of the United States, and their discharge on the fourth of July 1865. Without money, adequate clothing or food they were cast out of the hospitals, many of them were yet suffering from unhealed wounds. In this condition they were left to make their way home as best they could. Private Davidson finally reached home and was restored to health under the skillful treatment of Dr. G. W. Thornhill.

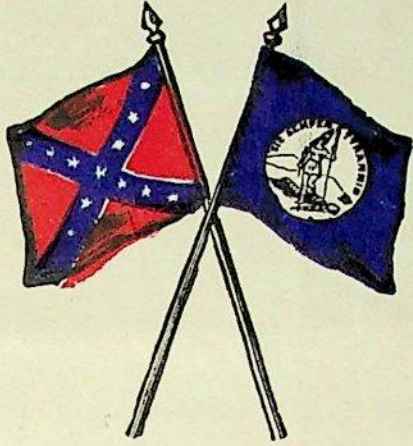

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RECORD OF SERVICES

In 1861, John William Davidson, of Appomattox County, Virginia, being then seventeen years of age, enlisted at Appomattox Court House in Company "H" of the Second Virginia Cavalry, Fitzhugh Lee's Brigade, Stewart's Division of the Army of Northern Virginia. He took part in the following battles: Second Battle of Manassas, Front Royal, Ashby's Gap, Winchester, Strasburg, Mt. Jackson, Woodstock, Ashland, Hall's Shop, Raccoon Ford, Stephensburg, Culpepper Court House, Fairfax Court House, Falls Church, Seven Pines, Fort Cannon, Dumfries, Spottsylvania Court House, and all battles which Fitzhugh Lee's Brigade took part in, being wounded at *Aldu*, near the close of the war. General Munford, in speaking of Corporal Davidson, said that no braver soldier ever unsheathed a sword. After serving faithfully throughout the war, he surrendered at Appomattox with General Lee.

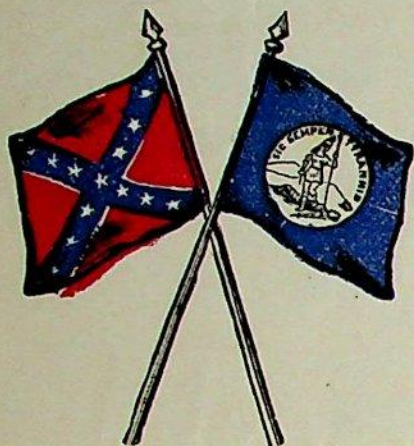

In Spring of 62 the Company was ordered to Norfolk and changed to Heavy Artillery had charge of Battery on Craney Island. Below Norfolk witnessed the engagement between the Monitor and Merrimack. when Norfolk was evacuated His company was ordered to Richmond and assigned Co "A" 20th Battalion Va Heavy Artillery and manned the inner works of Richmond Defences until the fall of 1864 then was sent to Chaffins Bluff and become a part of G. 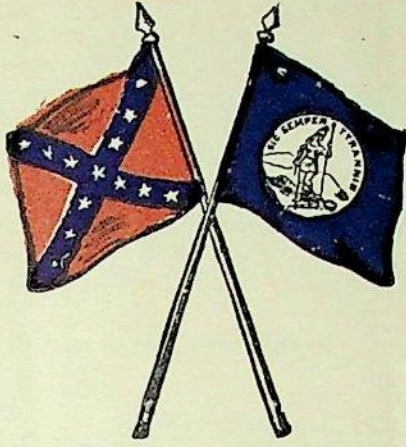

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Record of Services

James Paschal Leigh Fleckman joined Company A-20th Virginia Artillery Battalion in September 1864 and did garrison duty on Brook road, about two and one-half miles north of Richmond, until January 28th, 1865.

The Company was sent to Chapin's farm on James River, where they were stationed when Richmond was evacuated, and they witnessed the blowing up of the three Confederate gunboats in James River.

They left Chapin's farm with one day's rations on the night of April 2nd, 1865, drew one-third of a pound of meat and one-third of a pound of meal the day following and subsisted upon sassafras buds as food for the

balance. Was in the engagement
at Sailor's Creek where
four were killed, thirty
wounded and nearly all of
the command were captured,
the rest of whom surrendered
at Appomattox.

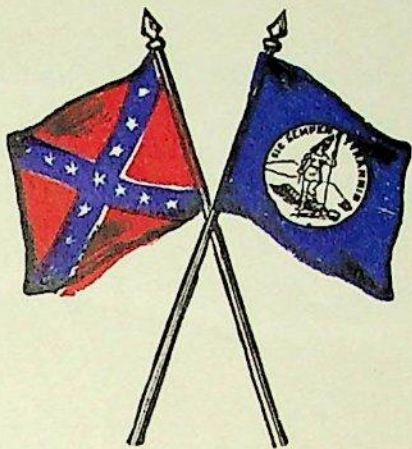

Said member being entitled to all the honors and privileges of this Association except that of holding any office in the General Association, divisions, or chapters; except that of transmitting this honor to members of her family, only her children of a Confederate father. The honor dies with her if she has no children.

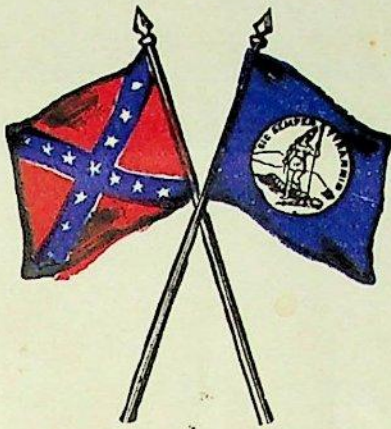

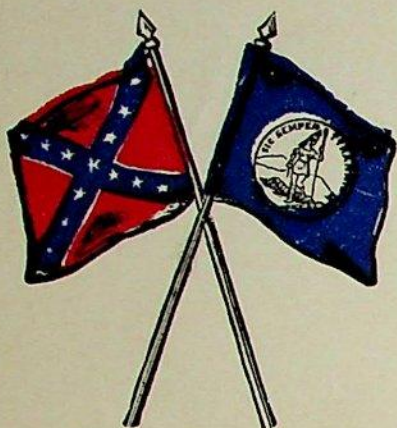

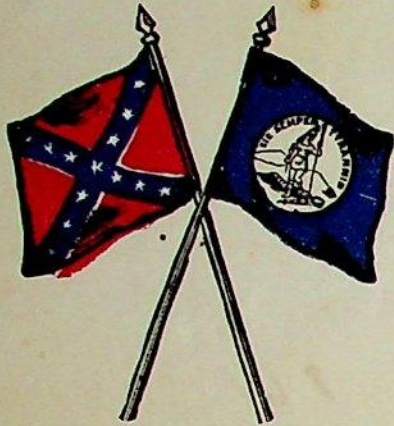
