**THOMAS GIBSON HOBBS, JR.**

Thomas Gibson Hobbs Jr. son of Thomas Gibson Hobbs and Melville Bolling, was born in Lynchburg, Virginia, on Dec. 25, 1917. He was graduated from E.C. Glass High School, attended Lynchburg College for two years and went on to graduate from the University of Virginia with a degree in mechanical engineering. Upon graduation, he went to work for U.S. Steel in Youngstown, Ohio.

When he returned to Lynchburg after World War II, he worked at Lynchburg Foundry as an engineer. Later he became plant manager of C.B. Fleet Company, was in charge of manufacturing, and retired as vice-president.

Gibson served in the U.S. Navy in World War II aboard the *USS Enterprise*. He remained in the Naval Reserve for 20 years and retired as lieutenant commander. He loved anything with a motor and enjoyed being a pilot in his youth.

His family has been members of First Christian Church for more than 100 years. Gibson served the church he loved in many capacities as deacon, elder and as a member of the board. He was honored for his many achievements at a special recognition luncheon Nov. 23, 2003.

He was devoted to Lynchburg College, serving on the Board of Trustees for 39 years (25 of those years as secretary to the board), and was an honorary life trustee. He was awarded the Thomas Gibson Hobbs Memorial Award as well as an honorary degree. He was a member of the Board of Directors of the Engineering School at the University of Virginia, was president of the Virginia Engineering Foundation of the University of Virginia and was financial advisor to his fraternity Sigma Alpha Epsilon.

He was a member of the Lynchburg Rotary Club and chronicled the history of the club beginning in 1917. He served as their president in 1965 and said one of his fondest memories was traveling to the Rotary International Convention.

Gibson loved the study of genealogy and assisted many people in gathering information about people, places and things. After a heart attack more than 30 years ago, he began clearing land that was once family property at Mt. Athos and along the riverfront in downtown Lynchburg. In his retirement, he spent untold hours clearing land and researching the James River and Kanawha Canal and wrote about them for many publications, including articles for Lynch's Ferry Magazine and the Iron Worker. He was a member of the Virginia Canals and Navigations Society and was director emeritus of the American Canal Society as well as serving on their boards where he was recognized for his diligent collection of documents regarding historic properties. He also wrote about and researched old railroads and mills. Many of his documents and papers have been

donated to Jones Memorial Library where he was a member of their Board of Directors. He was a former member of the City Planning Commission.

He professed to hate history in high school and yet became one of the city's foremost historians. He was a member of Lynchburg Historical Foundation, the Amherst County Historical Society, the Campbell County Historical Society, the Sarah Winston Henry Branch of the Association for the Preservation of Virginia Antiquities, the Jamestowne Society, and the Lynchburg Civil War Round Table. He served on the steering committee for the Blackwater Creek Natural Area and was also a longtime member of the SPHEX Club in Lynchburg.

Thomas Gibson Hobbs, Jr., died at his home in Lynchburg on 25 October 2005 and was buried in Spring Hill Cemetery.
